

After an amusement park buys up the neighboring farms, Happy takes a job with them as an attendant, saving money for a clandestine journey to Europe, where he'll finally land a breakout role. Little does he know his immigration is being coordinated by an Italian crime syndicate.

After a nightmarish passage to Italy, Happy still manages to find relief in food and fantasy, even as he is forced into everworsening work conditions over a debt he allegedly accrued in transit and his daydreams grow increasingly at odds with his bleak reality.

At turns funny and poetic, sunny and tragic, *Happy* is a daring feat of postmodern literature, a polyphonic novel about the urgent, lovely coping mechanisms created by generations of diasporic people. Set against the enmeshed crises of global migration and the politics of labor within the food industry, Celina Baljeet Basra's luminous debut argues for the things that are essential to human survival: food, water, a place to lay one's head, but also pleasure, romance, art, and the inalienable right to a vivid inner life.



Celina Baljeet Basra is a writer and curator based in Berlin. She graduated from the Free University Berlin, where she studied Art History in a Global Context, and has since worked with Nature Morte Delhi, Kunstraum Kreuzberg/Bethanien, Galerie im Turm, Berlin Biennale, Times Art Center Berlin, Talking Objects Lab, and other art institutions at the local and international level. Her residencies include stays with Shanghai Curators Lab and Kochi Biennale and she was awarded both curatorial and literary research scholarships from the Berlin Senate. 

The arrangement is strictly platonic, of course—for him. But Natasha can't help but wonder whether he might be the solution to all her problems.

As Natasha's obsession with Zach grows and her involvement in increasingly dystopian "churnalism" deepens, her worlds threaten to collide in the most cataclysmic, extremely public way.



Holly Baxter is a journalist and writer from Newcastle, who spent 12 years working in London journalism before transferring to New York City in 2019. Having reported for *The Guardian* and *The New Statesman*, she now does political satire and social justice-themed investigations for *The Independent*. Her work was shortlisted for a Press Award for Feature of the Year in 2019 and she often appears on British radio and television. In 2013, she co-authored THE VAGENDA, a media satire non-fiction book for women, with *The Guardian*'s Rhiannon Lucy Cosslett. ### P.T. Deutermann IWO, 26 CHARLIE

P. T. Deutermann is a contemporary master of World War II military fiction: writing about the lives, deaths, dreams, fears, and combat experiences of sailors and soldiers, generals and grunts, captains and snipes, pilots and submariners, who served in the Pacific theatre war against Japan.

The island of Iwo Jima was the epic land and sea battle that produced one of the iconic images of WWII: the Marines raising the American flag on Mount Surabachi, an active volcano that was the site of intense hand to hand combat. In this gripping novel, the tenth of his WWII thrillers, Deutermann follows a young gunnery liaison officer, Lee Bishop, who during the ferocious battle for the island is pulled from his station aboard the USS Nevada to serve on-shore as a spotter, calling in coordinates for the ship to target with missiles.



















### Anna Dorn PERFUME & PAIN

Twelve-steppers might call Astrid Dahl a love addict, but she's not a twelve-stepper, she's a romantic... To Astrid, love is the best drug and she's tried them all. The novel opens with Astrid meeting Ivy, the enigmatic PhD student in her lesbian Zoom writing group, Sapphic Scribes. Seducing Ivy quickly becomes Astrid's raison d'etre.


A novelist, Astrid just sold the TV rights to her book for a lump sum and is focused exclusively on quitting the "magic cocktail" she calls The Patricia Highsmith, which she took throughout her 20s to thrive. But like all coping mechanisms, it turned on her—and started jeopardizing her wellbeing and career. Worse, Astrid's landlord makes her leave her perfect bungalow to one sharing a yard with an artist, Penelope.




Penelope quickly becomes a problem. Astrid is private and Penelope is nosy. As Astrid obsesses over Ivy, ignoring all the red flags, Penelope becomes the bane of Astrid's existence, interfering with her cherished privacy. The red flags become banners, but Astrid uses her fiction brain to narrativize around them, until an unexpected love triangle develops.

PERFUME & PAIN is a novel about a woman escaping the historic trappings of lesbian melodrama, the suggestion that lesbian romance be doomed and crazy-making, to accept real intimacy as she enters into midlife.

Twenty-five-year-old Penelope Lin spends her days cataloging an archeology museum's vast collection of Qing Dynasty-era bound feet shoes, wandering the streets of Philadelphia appreciating its architecture, and reading up on her beloved hero, Napoleon. After suffering her first big heartbreak several years ago, she's built a quiet life with a few close friends and no romantic entanglements. While running a work errand one day, she happens to meet Hoang, who has just confessed to releasing the lab mice in the cancer research lab he works at. He will almost certainly be fired, but he hates to lie. Hoang's

openness catches Penelope off guard and from then on, she finds her carefully constructed life slowly start to unravel.

Terrified of "leaping into the same sea from which [she'd] already once escaped," Penelope pursues Hoang in ways that breach her comfort zone but remain bewilderingly oblique to her no-nonsense friends and, of course, to Hoang himself. Her days become consumed with volunteering with a labor union for an excuse to run into him, though she has never even voted, and agonizing over letters and postcards that skirt her true feelings. When she receives an unexpected visit from her ex-boyfriend and learns a jarring revelation regarding the whereabouts of her estranged mother, Penelope is forced to confront her past in order to take a leap of faith.

GINGKO SEASON is a wise and tender-hearted debut novel that explores the nature of our deepest friendships as seriously as it does the dizzying terror and thrill of falling in love. With Raven Leilani's flaneur-like prose, GINGKO SEASON channels the wry humor and quiet devastation of Rachel Khong's GOODBYE, VITAMIN. Readers who were charmed by Elif Batuman's protagonist Selin—fiercely intelligent but clueless in matters of the heart—will adore Penelope's curiosity and her precisely observed world.



Christmas 2018, we meet Rudy Coyle in the throes of a major quarter-life crisis. Quarter life, if he's lucky. Dumped, evicted, and fired from the family bar, Rudy gets a hail-Mary job as a doorman in a storied co-op on Park Avenue, where he comes under the wing of the family in 4E. Jacob, their fast-talking patriarch—think Michael Cohen via Saul Bellow—is one of a generation of lenders who made hundreds of millions of dollars in the cutthroat taxi medallion industry in the early 2000s, largely by preying on the American dreams of impoverished immigrant drivers. As Jacob, up to his eyeballs in debt, claws back his assets from a dangerous coterie of Brighton Beach associates, Rudy goes from errand boy to right-hand man to family man, becoming a fixture in the lives of Jacob's neglected son, his glamorous, manically-depressed wife, and his shy, sharp-eyed daughter, Marley, who narrates the story alongside Rudy. A private school pariah, Marley grows more aware of her father's misdeeds when she becomes involved with the son of a rival taxi tycoon. As she barrels down a path of rebellion, the family's dirty laundry comes to light, and Rudy must choose between his blue-collar conscience and white-collar ambitions.

Part crime comedy, part coming-of-age tale, ATTA BOY draws as much from Cally's experience on the Upper East Side, growing up in the environs of Gossip Girl, as it does her time tending bar at dives in lower Manhattan. Reminiscent of Whit Stillman's Metropolitan as well as Gary Shteyngart's zeitgeisty charm, balanced deftly with ripped-from-the-headlines social realism. ATTA BOY captures pre-pandemic New York in the full breadth of its grime and glitz, presenting the all-too-real medallion crisis through Rudy and Marley's eyes in a lyric, exuberant style that pulls the reader immediately along for the ride.

<u>Cally Fiedorek</u> is the winner of an Emerging Writer Fellowship from the Center for Fiction and a Pushcart Prize. Her work has appeared in Narrative—where she serves as a contributing editor—and the Senanee Review—where the novel's first chapter was recently excerpted. She graduated from Yale with a B.A. in History and from the University of Oxford with an MSt. in Creative Writing. She lives in Manhattan, in the house she grew up in, now with her husband and three young kids. ATTA BOY is her debut novel.

An artist of color becomes obsessed with a white model in a novel with the glamor of Clarice Lispector and the viscerality of Han Kang.

At an otherwise forgettable party in Los Angeles, a queer Korean American painter spots a woman who instantly controls the room: gorgeous and distant and utterly white, the center of everyone's attention. Haunted into adulthood by her Korean father's abandonment of his family, as well as the specter of her beguiling, abusive white mother, the painter finds herself caught in a perfect trap. She wants Hanne, or wants to be her, or to sully her, or destroy her, or consume her, or some confusion of all the above. Since she's an artist, she will use art to get closer to Hanne, beginning a series of paintings with her new muse as model. As for Hanne, what does she want? Her whiteness seems sometimes as cruel as a new sheet of paper.

When the paintings of Hanne become a hit, resulting in the artist's first sold-out show, she resolves to bring her new muse with her to Berlin, to continue their work, and her seduction. But, just when the painter is on

the verge of her long sought-after breakthrough, a petition started by a Black performance artist begins making the rounds in the art community, calling for the boycott of major museums and art galleries for their imperialist and racist practices.

Torn between her desire to support the petition, to be a success, and to possess Hanne, the painter and her reality become more unstable and disorienting, unwilling to cut loose any one of her warring ambitions, yet unable to accommodate them all. Is it any wonder so many artists self-destruct so spectacularly? Is it perhaps just a bit exciting to think she could too?

Your Love Is Not Good stuffs queer explosive into the cracks between identity and aspiration, between desire and art, and revels in the raining debris.

Johanna Hedva (they/them) is a Korean-American writer, artist, and musician, who was raised in Los Angeles by a

family of witches, and now lives in LA and Berlin. Their novel, *On Hell*, was named one of Dennis Cooper's favorites of 2018, and their writing has been published in *Triple Canopy*, *frieze*, and *The White Review*. Their art work has been shown at the Institute of Contemporary Arts, London; Performance Space New York; the Museum of Architecture and Design, Los Angeles; and the Museum of Contemporary Art on the Moon. In 2019, they released the album, The Sun and the Moon, and in 2020 they released *Minerva the Miscarriage of the Brain*, a collection of poetry, plays, and essays published by Sming Sming and Wolfman Books. Johanna is the author of the viral/seminal essay in disability justice, "Sick Woman Theory" (forthcoming in their essay collection, HOW TO TELL WHEN WE WILL DIE, from Zando in 2024—Zando has World rights). From a 2022-2023 Steinbeck Fellow, a Fiction Fellow at the Michener MFA program, and a Senior Fiction Editor at The Rumpus, comes Reena Shah's piercing family saga and debut novel, EVERY HAPPINESS.

EVERY HAPPINESS is the story of Ruchi and Deepa, childhood friends who immigrate with their families from Mumbai to the sunny, anesthetized suburbs of Connecticut in the 1970s. Though they arrive with Bollywood-inspired fantasies about love and family, their

relationships soon struggle under the weight of the model minority myth and hierarchies along caste, class, religion, and gender within the South Asian communities they encounter. As they fight to assert themselves, a forbidden intimacy binds Ruchi and Deepa, but it also produces a rivalry as the years pass and they keep constant score of each other's marriages, careers, and children.

Ruchi hunts for dignity in a clerical job at an OB/GYN office, trying to forget that she once aspired to be a doctor. Though she loves her son Moksh fiercely, Ruchi often fails to assert her love when it matters most, hiding his differences as a false form of protection. Moksh meanwhile retreats perilously deep into himself through disordered eating. Deepa and her family accrue wealth and status, but at a moral cost. After she catches her daughter Anu making out with a girl, Deepa refuses to accept it, even as she recognizes a similar desire in herself. When a scandal shakes their community and lays bare the fault lines in their families, Ruchi and Deepa must reckon with the secrets they've kept to preserve appearances. Years later, Anu and Moksh must in turn contend with the shame they've inherited from their mothers and the intimacy they still long for in adulthood.

Told in multiple points-of-view, the novel weaves between Mumbai in the 1960s and Connecticut in the '70s through '90s, culminating in the 2010s. In the vein of Avni Doshi's BURNT SUGAR and Elena Ferrante's THE LOST DAUGHTER, EVERY HAPPINESS delves into the culture of repression and silence that pervades so many South Asian immigrant households, and the ripple effect this has on the children who grow up in them. In Kimberly King Parsons' words, it is "moving and unforgettable, containing what I love most about fiction: a lush, unique, urgent voice steeped in cultural relevance, biting humor, and sentences that swerve and surprise."

Reena Shah is a writer, editor, and teacher. He knows that if they are to enjoy a future together, she will need to resolve her issues with her father first.

Stewart wrote the iconic film based largely on his own experiences as a Naval Officer during the Vietnam era. From its release in 1982, the film (starring Richard Gere, Louis Gossett Jr., and Debra Winger) has been an inspiration to generations. The film's Cinderella ending has inspired millions of men around the world to propose to women by first lifting them up in their arms like Zack did with Paula when he carried her out of that factory.

Over the past four decades, the story has been frequently parodied in popular television shows and has become part of the global zeitgeist. Considered a cinema classic, the film has been heralded as one of the ten best and ten most profitable love stories in film history. The world responded to an uplifting love story in 1982 and it is even more hungry for such a story now.

Like "An Officer and a Gentleman", AN OFFICER AND A GENTLEMAN'S DAUGHTER is about the power of love to heal the secrets of the heart, a theme in **Douglas Day Stewart**'s writing. His screenwriting credits include "The Boy in the Plastic Bubble," (John Travolta), "The Blue Lagoon," (Brooke Shields) and "A – The Scarlet Letter" (Demi Moore and Gary Oldman). 
### Lynn Buchanan THE DOLLMAKERS

THE DOLLMAKERS is a beautifully-written and self-contained debut fantasy about art and creation, self-possession and self-discovery, growth, and the nebulous balance between accepting less than you deserve and reaching for more than you can grasp.

Dollmakers are the backbone of the country called One. An artisan's doll is the height of society while a guard's doll is the only thing standing between the people of One and the Shod: vicious cobbled monstrosities which will tear apart any structure, living or dead, inanimate or otherwise, to add to their horde.




But honestly, how is that her fault? Her dolls are works of art, yes, but they are meant to be more than the frivolous companions of children. *She* is meant to be more. And if the other dollmakers refuse to see that, she'll just have to make them.

When her mentor sends her to the remote village called Web to glean some wisdom from Ikiisa, the reclusive guard dollmaker there, Shean gets to work on a plan of her own. Surely her masterpieces are superior to the dolls of some country bumpkin dollmaker. If she can convince Web to hire her as their dollmaker instead, the Licensor Guild will have to recognize the error of their ways and grant her a guard's license. Whatever happens to dollmaker Ikiisa after that is her problem.

But all is not as it seems, and Shean may be in for more than she bargained for. In the village called Web, Shean will uncover secrets about the Shod, the dolls, dollmaker Ikiisa, and herself that will change the country called One forever.

THE DOLLMAKERS is part of a planned series of standalones all set in the same fantasy world, featuring varying casts of unique, colorful characters knit together by a single recurring character whose overarching story concludes in the final two books of the series. The structure of the series is similar to the Penric and Desdemona books by Lois McMaster Bujold, the Discworld books by Terry Pratchett, or the various Cosmere books/series of Brandon Sanderson--self-contained adventures with wider-world-implicating drama in the background that, by the end of the series, will culminate in a large-scale conflict. Five of these standalones have already been written.

<u>Lynn Buchanan</u> is a fantasy writer based in the foothills of some impressive, chilly mountains in Utah. Every Sunday for six years, Emily Mester and her family went not to church, but Costco. For Emily's father, a corporate lawyer who grew up solidly middle-class in rural Iowa, Costco, and all that it promised with its bulk-buy deals and seemingly endless cavernous warehouse space, inspired a devotion akin to religion.

So begins Emily's funny, tender, yet incisive debut essay collection **AMERICAN BULK:** Essays about Stuff, which combines memoir and cultural criticism in an urgent excavation of modern-day consumerism, from Costco to sweepstakes to the multibillion-dollar waste industry. Emily tells the story of her




grandmother, her father, and herself, and their shared love for accumulating, hoarding, collecting, consuming—in other words, their love for *stuff*. From the house her grandmother has abandoned in Storm Lake, Iowa, filled to the brim with a lifetime of collected detritus, to the brand new warehouse her father has built for his pathological online shopping habits, Emily explores the shrines—physical and otherwise—that we build to stuff, as well as the anxieties about scarcity, class, and financial insecurity that underwrite them. Far from a detached observer, Emily also indicts herself as a willing and vigorous participant, allowing herself to balance knowing reflection with sharp critique.

But Emily turns her sharp eye outwards too, in essays that delve deep into the uniquely American obsession with what she calls bulk culture, characterized by our love for acronyms like BOGO and AYCE, endless breadsticks, and loyalty programs. She brings us to the American mall and fat camp, to Yelp review pages and plasma donation clinics, and even to the Texas-sized Pacific Ocean garbage patch in her mission to understand how consumerism and capitalism holds her—and us all—in thrall. And like all good love stories, this one ends in death—in this case, our environment's and thus ultimately our own, a slow one brought on by the dark side of stuff: waste.

Part family history, part cultural critique, and part cautionary tale, Emily Mester's **AMERICAN BULK** shares literary DNA with Patricia Lockwood's sharp but intimate portrayal of family in *Priestdaddy* and Jenny Odell's critiques of capitalism and the culture it begets in *How to Do Nothing*, and introduces a clear-eyed, empathetic, and deeply intelligent writer who acutely identifies the true cost of all the *stuff* we love.

## Simon Wu DANCING ON MY OWN: Essays on Art, Joy, and Collectivity

A lot of words describe Simon Wu, all of which would be true: artist, writer, curator, first-generation Burmese American, gay, son of immigrant parents. Taken together, this laundry list of identity markers may even give you a sense of who he is. But what constitutes an "identity"? To what ends does "identifying" aspire, and what is left for us if and when it fails?

These are the questions that Wu grapples with in his electrifying debut essay collection, **DANCING ON** 



MY OWN: On Art, Joy, and Collectivity, that weaves memoir, cultural history and critique, and art writing to open new and startling lines of inquiry into how we understand ourselves, through the exploration of topics as varied as Telfar bags, immigration patterns, class aspirationalism, queer dance parties,1980s Asian American art collectives, and the Berlin rave scene.

Taking a unique narrative journey that moves Wu—and by extension, the reader—through three inflection points, DANCING ON MY OWN first explores how identity is formed, whether that is through what one does or consumes or makes, before moving on to how identity is disrupted, whether that is through what it is defined against or the political and communal history that we seem destined to forget and repeat, and ending, finally, on how identity can be lost, whether that is considering theories of queer ecology or drawing from the Buddhism Wu grew up with.

Like the Robyn song that it shares a name with, **DANCING ON MY OWN** is melancholy yet triumphant, and ultimately an anthem about the joy of discovering oneself. In critically examining the ways that we have always conceived of ourselves and our identities through the lens of his own life and passions, Wu draws on the work of authors such as Cathy Park Hong, Jeremy Atherton Lin, and Hanif Abdurraqib to create an astonishing collection by an incredible young author, as inquisitive and empathetic as the never-ending journey to understand ourselves.

Simon Wu is an artist and writer involved in collaborative art production and research. Since 2017, he has served as a Curator and the sole Program Coordinator for Claudia Rankine's Racial Imaginary Institute. She is the former Editor-in-Chief at Salt Hill Journal, and the author of three books of poetry: Glorious Veils of Diane (Carnegie Mellon UP, 2021), Inside Ball Lightning (SEMO Press, 2020), and Porcupine in Freefall (winner of the Bright Hill Press Poetry Book Competition, 2019).
