MOST BEAUTIFUL THINGS begins with the murder of the man who built a gambling empire that's created an entire town, Awantas—and a phone call to Alicia, his illegitimate daughter, who is now set to inherit a fortune she never knew existed.

What Alicia believed before this phone call: she was the only child of a housewife and an engineer, a family man who died when Alicia was eight. As a child, she found brief, fierce solace in a girl named June, whose family moved away from their small mining town after a cruel and random tragedy.

As it turns out, none of this was true. Her father was the richest man in Malaysia, living in Awantas with his real family. His widow would rather kill than recognize the bastard daughter or her mother. To claim her inheritance and untangle the sudden mystery of her life, Alicia must enter the world of moneyed hustlers, desperate stragglers, violent gangsters—and among them she finds June, working to grease the wheels of the empire. As Alicia and June unravel the years since they last saw each other, their feelings bloom, pushing back against a climate in which queer love cannot exist.

MOST BEAUTIFUL THINGS is an epic family crime novel a la Age of Vice. It's a ravenous exploration of lust and luxury, a drama of affluence to rival White Lotus and Crazy Rich Asians. It's a forbidden queer love story and a boldly painted canvas of perspectives across social classes. It's a house of cards that never crumbles, never reveals its intricate foundation until all the inhabitants step out into the light.

The four Longe siblings, born in Chicago to Nigerian immigrant parents, are making a mess of their lives. When Anjola, the third-eldest, returns to her hometown for residency at an underfunded public hospital and learns that her best friend is engaged to someone else, she begins to search more honestly for her true feelings about him and her life choices so far.

Meanwhile, eldest daughter Sola's ex cheats on her in the most public way possible, blowing up her budding career as an influencer and landing her on a friend's couch. Karen, the baby of the family, feels lost at college, insecure about her autoimmune condition, and unsure of her sexuality. And Ola, their only brother and the oldest child, has succeeded by every measure, but with a baby on the way, it's exactly the wrong time for him to be questioning his relationship with his white wife, or his ability to raise a Black son in America.

Amidst questions of social class, racial belonging, and the search for vocation, HOUSE LONGE HAS GONE ASTRAY asks uncomfortable and necessary questions: How important is romantic love, really? What do we owe to our parents for raising us, and can we forgive them for their secrets and lies? The fateful outcome of a holiday family dinner forces each of the Longes to take stock of what really matters—in their love lives, professional identities, and in one another.

Sold at auction in an NA deal, a work of nonfiction that will vividly illuminate the hidden links between mental illness and memory, and that aims to rehabilitate the image of electroconvulsive therapy, which caused the author to lose his memory—but saved his life

Sitting in a circle at Sibley Memorial Hospital in Washington, D.C., 35-year-old writer Ted Scheinman remembered why he was there. He had checked himself into the psychiatric ward after months of worsening, eventually paralytic depression to undergo an aggressive course of electroconvulsive therapy (ECT)-more colloquially known as "shock treatment." Before turning to ECT as a last resort, Ted had submitted himself, without relief, to nearly every form of psychiatry: prescriptions for every SSRI and SSNI on the ketamine infusions, cognitive behavioral therapy, psychodynamic therapy, mindfulness-based therapy. But now, buzzing from his first zap in the ECT chair, he recollected little of all that-not even what he'd had for breakfast that morning. He couldn't remember the names of the fellow sufferers with whom he was now playing slapjack, or the phone call last night to his mom. All he had were the notes he'd written in his journal or had scrawled on construction paper during art therapy.

That's one of the things the electricity can do to you before snapping you back to life.

Ted's account of his descent into and emergence from major depression—and the accompanying memory loss—is the canvas for a broader investigation into the history and effectiveness of ECT, the links between memory and depression, and how our memories make us who we are. Despite Ted's great loss, his amnesia—a rare severe case—ultimately proves a small price to pay for the new shot at life offered by electroconvulsive therapy.

JOLT is a beautiful, funny, philosophical and ultimately hopeful memoir, which also raises big questions about memory, mental health, and the treatment of depression. It is for readers of books like Rachel Aviv's *Strangers to Ourselves*, Robert Kolker's *Hidden Valley Road*, and Susannah Calahan's *Brain on Fire*.

Striker is not entirely sure that she should be on this luxury Antarctic cruise. She's a forty-year-old Black location scout, and her mission is to photograph potential film locations for a big-budget film while enjoying the fancy accommodations, the excursions, and the quirks of a small group of rich people who have decided to explore one of the last wild places on earth. While out kayaking on the Southern Ocean, a horrific accident occurs, leaving several of the kayakers dead and the survivors stranded without a guide on a remote island along the Antarctic Peninsula. The survivors include staff from the ship as well as the wealthy tourists, though the group is predominantly white except for Striker, who is herself a transracial adoptee.

An abandoned cabin, mysterious rock formations, a missing child; none of these frighten Striker as much as the visions that threaten to unravel her sanity in this hostile place. As their party dwindles and the earth seems to reject them soul by soul, survival becomes something that inspires fear as much as desire.

MY GOD IS GODLY is a work that neither comforts nor offers closure as the icy vastness of the Antarctic region reflects the characters' inner demons back to them. Quan Barry's canvas is as vast as the Antarctic itself, and yet she's able to create a very specific fever dream that is at its root about the existence of Blackness in white spaces. For fans of Leave the World Behind, Stephen Graham Jones' books, and the films of Jordan Peele.

In the vein of Alissa Nutting and Melissa Broder, OPEN UP is a hilariously absurdist, devastatingly vulnerable novel for anyone who craves an intimacy they can't quite reach

Thirty-something journalist Olive just wants people to open up. As a radio host, she interviews writers about their works-in-progress, probing for insight; as a friend and a sister, she's hungry for closeness. She has a habit of recording people without their knowledge, just to hear the world reflected back at her. Olive is approaching her midthirties, coddled by her mother and perpetually single, when she meets Henry. He's a surgeon—he literally cuts people open, which fascinates her—and, with a quick wit and a charming gap between his two front teeth, he seems to adore her. Henry relishes her curious mind, upending everything she's come to expect from men.

They fall for each other quickly, dizzyingly, but Olive can't get enough. She struggles to comprehend where she stops and Henry begins. As their relationship intensifies, so does Olive's resentment of the physical and emotional boundaries between them. So she tests those boundaries: first by recording their conversations, then by recording their sex. Next, on a night there's no coming back from, she unzips his body and nestles between his organs while he sleeps. Once she starts, she can't stop—and as she climbs inside Henry, Olive has some disturbing revelations about intimacy, trust, and her own long-repressed memories.

OPEN UP pushes the boundaries of genre; it's tense, thoughtful, occasionally grotesque—but it's also incredibly accessible and laugh-out-loud funny. Fans of Jen Beagin's *Big Swiss*, Raven Leilani's *Luster*, and Phoebe Waller-Bridge's work will love this. And as in Samanta Schweblin's novels and Paul Thomas Anderson's *Phantom Thread*, the descent into the kinky and strange takes place slowly and then all at once.

Evie Duarte is drowning in student loan debt, teaching algebra to the spawn of Beverly Hills, when she becomes a famous murderess. The press anoint her the new Charles Manson, a bloodthirsty ninety-nine percenter hoping to spark a class war.

The problem is that Evie didn't kill anybody. She was simply in the wrong mansion at the wrong time.

When Evie arrives at Serena Victor's modern-day castle one Sunday for their weekly lesson, she finds, in lieu of a bored teenager, pure carnage. 



There are moments when a single choice can define an entire life. But when Haiwen secretly decides to enlist in the army to keep his brother from the draft, their shared future is shattered. Their paths take them far afield from each other, with the exception of one pivotal chance encounter on the Hong Kong ferry in 1966.

Sixty years later, Haiwen, now in his late seventies, is bagging bananas at a supermarket in California when he once more sees Suchi. They rekindle their friendship, and might have a second chance to live the life they were supposed to have together. But the weight of the past is constantly with them, and only time will tell if they are able to forge something new.

Spanning seven decades, through the most tumultuous period of modern Chinese history up to contemporary times. HOMESEEKING has the craft and sweep of Min Jin Lee's *Pachinko* and the heart necessary to keep book club readers hanging on her every word.



Ayukta is finally sitting down with her wife Nadya to respond to a question she's long avoided: Should they have a child? The decision is complicated by a secret her family has kept for centuries, one that Ayukta will be the first to share with someone outside their bloodline: the women in her family inherit a mysterious tapestry, through which each generation can experience the memories of those who came before her.

A dazzling and ambitious debut novel that follows a cosmopolitan Shanghai household backward in time—beginning in 2040 and moving through our present and the recent past—exploring their secrets, their losses, and the ways a family makes and remakes itself across the years

Beginning on a high-speed train in 2040, the narrative lens chooses middle-aged Leo Yang. Leo has just dropped off his family at the airport: his wife, Eko, and two older daughters, Yumi and Yoko, while the youngest waits at home. What follows is a sequence of stories reaching backwards across the decades, from each family member's perspective as well as that of those who work for them—a private driver, a nanny—to show, better than any linear narrative could, the way a family is broken while it forms: stubborn, paranoid Leo; longing, impulsive Eko; impatient Yumi; forgotten Yoko; precocious, furious "Baby" Kiko.

A nod to *Dubliners*, the titular city of SHANGHAILANDERS is richly present in each story. Lagos, 2005. Margaret, at sixty-five, has managed her schizophrenia throughout a successful career and has at last claimed her reward: a comfortable parcel in a gated community where the neighbors show her the deference she deserves. Her ex-husband Benjamin is living alone in Atlanta, a happy enough man but one who is at a loss for who to list as his "next of kin" when his heart trouble acts up. The couple hasn't seen each other in four decades—not since the day in 1966 when Benjamin left Margaret and their seven-month-old daughter, Nwando, on the floor of their kitchen in Lagos, the city where the couple met and fell in love.

Now Nwando, a wife and mother herself, has bridged this long unbridgeable gap, secretly reaching out to her father. Meanwhile Margaret's hard-won peace erupts after a sudden act of violence, causing her to wonder if the western psychiatry and prayer she's long leaned on are still right for her. When Nwando's son in turn begins to show signs of instability, Margaret decides it's time to explore a different approach—time to return to the village she left a lifetime ago, and time to face the generational trauma that has shaped her and Benjamin both, sending the entire family headlong into a reckoning with trespasses intimate and ancestral.

Unfolding across three parallel timelines, from the moment of early 1900s colonial intrusion in one Nigerian village, through the couple's love story in the newly liberated Lagos of the 1960s, to the novel's present, THIS KIND OF TROUBLE brilliantly complicates Eurocentric conceptions of mental illness—all the while asking us whether, and how, we're beholden to the past, and the future.

Maya and Natasha are twin sisters born in the midst of the Siege of Leningrad in 1941 and immediately abandoned by their mother, a prima ballerina at the Kirov Ballet who would rather die than not dance. Taken in by their mother's best friend at the Kirov, the girls are raised to be dancers themselves. The Vaganova Academy of Ballet—and the totalitarian Soviet regime—is the only world they know.

In 1958, now seniors at the Vaganova at the height of the Cold War, all Maya and Natasha and their classmates want is to dance with the Kirov, and to join the company on its tour to America next year. Both sisters have sacrificed their childhoods, their bodies, and more than a little sanity for this opportunity. Natasha longs for the material comforts of Western life. Maya hopes to find a connection to the mother she never knew.

Then a new law from the Kremlin upends Maya and Natasha's lives: due to fears of defection, family members may no longer travel abroad together. The Kirov can only accept one of them. As the stronger performer, Natasha takes her success for granted and falls in with a crowd of reckless dissidents obsessed with the West. Maya, long accustomed to living in her sister's shadow, accepts her bitter fate, until a new dance partner inspires her to dream bigger and practice harder. For the first time—and at the cruelest possible moment—the sisters are equally matched. And then one sister betrays the other, altering their lives forever and splitting them in two, though neither will stray far from each other's orbit.

Loosely based on the author's hometown and family, who have lived on the same plot of land in West Tennessee for over 150 years, ALL GOD'S CHILDREN continues the conversation on Black religion, folklore, and love that goes back to Zora Neale Hurston and Toni Morrison, and will live in the space that includes Jesmyn Ward, Honorée Fanonne Jeffers, Yaa Gyasi, and Robert Jones Jr.



Over generations, an elite class of Sainted formed, the descendants of those who gave up the most to found mankind's last redoubt.

Saint Enita Malovis, long accustomed to luxury, feels the end of her life and decades of work as a bio-prosthetist approaching. The lone practitioner of her art, Enita—called Saint Stitch-Skin by her clients—fears her important work will not continue after she's gone. To preserve her legacy, she's undertaken a final incredible project: creating a being that can succeed her by downloading her personal Al, called Nix, into a real physical body. Her greatest worry is the loss of her craft—until a fellow Sainted is brutally murdered in his home, and the city Al inexplicably erases the event from its data. As they develop a fraught but powerful bond with Neren, a rare "Body Martyr" who donates her organs to ailing Sainted, Enita and Nix are drawn into the war between Bulwark's hidden underclass and the programs that impose and maintain order.



A polyphonic reimagining of an old French folktale, this polyphonic novel tells the story of Bluebeard—one of our earliest and most revered serial killers—and twists it into a stunning indictment of toxic masculinity

Something terrible has happened. In a mysterious apartment filled with ghosts, our unknown narrator tells a story to her child— how do I tell it? she wonders. How do I talk about this? The truth, she decides, must become something beautiful. This is a fairytale.

The tale begins with Agnes. After losing her own baby, Agnes is called to the great manor house to nurse the local lord's baby boy. But something is wrong with the child: his nails grow too fast, his skin smells of soil, and his eyes remind her of the forest. As he grows into a boy, then into man, a plague seems to follow him everywhere. Trees begin to wither at the roots, fruits rot on their branches, and the town turns desperate. The man takes a wife, who bears him a son. But tragedy strikes in cycles and his family is forced to consider their own malignancy—until wife after wife, death after death, plague after plague, every woman he touches becomes a ghost. The ghosts become a chorus, and they call urgently to our narrator as she tries to explain exactly what has happened to her. The ghosts can all agree on one thing, an inescapable truth about this man who has loved them and led them each to ruin: if you leave, you die. But if you die, you stay.

SOUR CHERRY examines our systems of power, the excuses we make for bad men, and the reasons we stay with them even after they hurt us. It gives us both a feminist sermon and a queer-inclusive folktale that scrutinizes gender and power, desire and dominance, adoration and violence.

And in a future Qin, one deceased protagonist awakens in Reincarnation and is interrogated by an artificial intelligence calling itself the Angel.

A powerfully prescient and genre-bending debut, THESE MEMORIES DO NOT BELONG TO US compels us to question the ways in which governments and media manipulate history and collective imagination for our consumption, and encourages us to look beyond the sheen of convenient truths to unearth the real stories of struggle and sacrifice beneath.

A storm is coming.

Esther has always known this to be true—ever since she visited lyanifa, Yoruba priestess and conduit of the Ifa oracle, she has expected something terrible for her daughter Amina. Iyanifa has read the shells and prophesied a fate for Amina that Esther spends years trying to deny. Esther has raised her daughter to be safe, and faithful; rebellious in small daily ways, yet always aligned with the culture that has formed her. But Amina wants more than her mother's confined world. Amina wants America.

An elegant, devastating intergenerational novel, THE EDGE OF WATER is set half in Nigeria—chronicling the complex dynamics between mother and daughter, bound by familial expectations, religious oppression, and communal gossip—and half in New Orleans during the terror and tragedy of hurricane Katrina. Told partially by Esther, partially by Amina, and partially by lyanifa herself, a Nigerian spiritual guide and mother of mysteries, this novel examines one woman's tear toward freedom, away from the cultural expectations foisted upon her, and the unexpected ways a family shifts and changes over time.

Olufunke Grace Bankole writes with an otherworldly poetic style similar to Akwaeke Emezi's work, a sweeping sense of scope that recalls Imbolo Mbue's *Behold the Dreamers*, and a deep-seated understanding of culture and character similar to Ayobami Adebayo's *Stay with Me*, while satisfying fans of literary readers of earnest, meticulous writers like Elizabeth Strout or Lily King.

Like all convicts sent to Hibiscus Station, Young is forced to mine precious piezanite crystals from the lunar crust. When she first arrived, Young was selected to train as a Pomp—a technician that tries to predict the location of the explosive crystals, and her only chance of paying off her years-long penal debt early—but after washing out and attempting suicide, folks steer clear of her.

When she forgets her glove one shift, Young has a vision: the exact location of every crystal in the tunnels around her—except that she's not sure if it's real. Even if she can sense piezanite, the crystals are priceless, and there's no telling what the corporation that owns her debt might do if they suspect she can increase their profit margin. In the midst of her grief, her well-connected new lover, Gyu, comes to her with an offer: retry the training program she failed out of, and he'll ensure she makes it through.

With her new visions, Young can't fail—but as her training progresses, it starts to appear that the circumstances surrounding the accident weren't what they seemed, and that everyone—her new crew, the station staff, and even Gyu—are all hiding secrets of their own. As the noose around her tightens, Young's investigations reveal that everything she's taken as truth her entire life is almost certainly a lie—and if she doesn't find another way off Hibiscus Station soon, she's going to become the victim of another "mining accident."

Sold in a pre-empt to Mitzi Angel at FSG and in a 9-way auction in the UK, this is a lyrical, empathetic, philosophical guide—grounded in science and surprisingly universal—for expectant parents and anyone who's been born. We've seen nice movement on proposal and still have lots of room to grow!

Ceridwen Morris has been a labor doula and childbirth educator for twenty years, working with thousands of expectant parents in New York City, and this book is what her clients and students have been looking for—and asking her to write—for years (one of them, New Yorker staff writer Alexandra Schwartz, said a book based on her childbirth class would be "revolutionary").

HOW TO GIVE BIRTH is not about pregnancy or what comes after the baby is born, but the pivotal birth experience in between. It takes readers step by step through the fascinating bodily science of labor; the myriad procedures and tools of the hospital; and the tried-and-true strategies and techniques for coping with all that may come up during birth. Ceridwen dismantles the opposition in the "natural" vs medical birth debate and pushes against the trend toward birth horror. The book is intimate and story-driven, woven with accounts from her career as a doula, but always practical. It is also universal: Ceridwen was raised in the UK and has also spent time in the birthing communities in Australia. Her wisdom and advice is aimed at an audience anywhere in the world, not just those navigating the US healthcare system.

HOW TO GIVE BIRTH demystifies, clarifies, and takes the knowable unknowns out of labor and delivery. It is as attentive to the physical, mammalian experience of the laboring body as it is to the tech, the medicine, and the hospital institution. It makes room for the psychological, emotional, even spiritual aspects of birth but it is completely grounded in science and best medical evidence. It combines the practicality and research of classics like Heidi Murkoff's What to Expect When You're Expecting, Michel Odent's The Nature of Birth and Breastfeeding, and the more recent Emily Oster's Expecting Better, and the philosophy of Oliver Burkeman's Four Thousand Weeks (a comparison made by FSG), with an emotional sincerity and lyricality that makes it a pleasure, and a relief, to be in Ceridwen's assured company on the page.

Pre-empted in a significant deal in the U.S. and before it had even gone out on official submission in the U.K., this is truly one of our favorite projects to talk about, a stunning work of narrative nonfiction that has space, science, love and that will stretch your mind as profoundly as it stirs your heart

15 billion miles away, in the cold vacuum beyond the edge of the solar system, a human heart waits to beat again. It is suspended in gold and copper, a groove in a phonographic record that is bolted to the side of NASA's Voyager I satellite probe. It is the heartbeat of a young writer named Ann Druyan, who recorded it, along with her brainwaves, during an hour spent reflecting on the history of the Earth and on the experience of having just fallen in love, on a summer's day in 1977. Launched into space a few months later, Druyan's heartbeat is a track on the famous Golden Record: a compilation of Earth recordings assembled on the infinitesimal chance that alien intelligence might intercept the Voyager as it wanders through space.

This heartbeat, this pulsewave, is an interstellar message about humanity—what does it say about us? What does it convey about human life? This book tackles this question: not by attempting to predict some remote scene of unlikely alien decipherment, but by asking what the message—in the very form of its impulse to connect with others—can tell us about ourselves. THE HEARTBEAT AT THE EDGE OF THE SOLAR SYSTEM tells a spellbinding story of human emotional technology in which the search for knowledge and the search for intimacy are inseparably entwined.

The chapters in this book weave the cinematic story of Ann Druyan as she conceives of and executes her track for the Golden Record (while secretly falling in love with the project's technical director, Carl Sagan) with the little-known history of physiological recording (from pulse-reading to cardiographs to EEGs). And it traces the intergalactic paths of the Voyagers—pulsewave readers of the cosmos—whose signals back to Earth are expected to flicker out within the next five years.

YOU DIDN'T HEAR THIS FROM ME was born out of Kelsey McKinney's massively successful podcast, Normal Gossip, which has accrued six million listens in less than a year. As with all great works of pop culture, Normal Gossip began with a tweet. The forced isolation of 2020 had robbed Kelsey McKinney of her most precious pastime and she was ravenous. So, she sent a prayer out to her almost hundred-thousand Twitter followers and asked for their best normal gossip — the kind of juicy, innocuous stories you would usually hear about a friend-of-a-friend over drinks. And after the tweet went viral, Kelsey got to work. Normal Gossip premiered in January 2022, and the response to the twenty-seven episodes that have aired since has made it clear: this delicious IV drip of gossip hit a nerve. The question that listeners most often ask Kelsey is: which parts are true? And since turning gossip into a fulltime job, filling every quiet corner of her life with the emotional messiness of strangers, Kelsey is inclined to answer them with another question: why does it matter?

Braiding journalism, cultural criticism, and Kelsey's personal experience, YOU DIDN'T HEAR THIS FROM ME interrogates that sticky and slippery plea for truth that lives at the heart of gossip's cultural chokehold. From the art of eavesdropping to our toxic expectations of celebrities, from gossip's influence on major historical events to the science of why our brains hunger for other people's drama, and from the power of gossip within labor rights' organizing to why the ending of the original Gossip Girl TV show was so damn infuriating — McKinney unmasks what we're actually searching for when we demand to know the truth, and why we are (almost always) disappointed once we learn it.

Women's unique experiences of trauma have gone understudied, and undertreated, for decades. The trends are perplexing and alarming: victims of intimate partner violence, for example, are believed to experience neurotrauma at higher rates than either athletes or soldiers, and yet most suffer in secret, without treatment. Meanwhile, clinicians frequently misdiagnose women who are suffering from psychological trauma with disorders they do not have, including borderline personality disorder and bipolar disorder. Ineffective treatments—from behavioral therapies to drugs—often follow, sometimes making trauma symptoms worse.

Because so much trauma research has treated men as the default, studying male specimens almost exclusively, it has failed to account for the ways trauma rewires women's brains, and is carried by their bodies, in ways that differ from men.

From one of the top journalists covering motorsport, ON THE GRID is an engaging, colorful cultural history of Formula One rooted in stories of the people who make the sport what it is—not just drivers and team principles, but men and women from across the paddock: mechanics, trainers, strategists, engineers, track designers, party planners, and more. For behind every driver, there are as many as 1,200 whose work directly impacts the outcome of each race.

The ambition for the book is to be inviting to newer fans, but with plenty of untold, inside stories to capture the diehards too. It's meant to be fun and celebratory, reaching deep into F1 history, but ON THE GRID will also take an honest look at the sport's historical shortcomings, and how it's evolving with the changing world—e.g., to be more sustainable and inclusive. Above all, Luke hopes readers come away with a deeper love for the sport and real insight into what life is really like inside it.



What was that game we used to play when we were children? We played it every night, before things went wrong between us.

It was a story game, wasn't it?

In the humid dark of a eucalyptus-scented room, a woman named Hui lies on a mattress telling stories about herself to her listener, a little girl. She talks about her identity as the child of an immigrant, her feelings about being in a mixed-race marriage, her opinions on mental health. But as the stories progress, it becomes clear that a volatile secret is lurking beneath their surface. There are events in Hui's past that have great significance for the person she's become, but that have gone missing from her memory. What is it, exactly, that is haunting Hui? In 2010, at the age of 25, Elizabeth fled the U.S. for Berlin, determined to outrun the heartache she carried from the recent death of her beloved little brother. With a suitcase full of rare vinyl records, \$500 in savings, and a desperate need to stay in motion, she spent the next five years DJing in Berlin's dives and dark hideaways. On vibrant nights at rock and roll nostalgia clubs, the sonic joy of Black music was sure to mute her pain. She happily spun (vinyl only! no music after 1969!) for nostalgia chasers, but once she was settled, she made a startling discovery: the white party-goers on the dance floor weren't just moving to the music of her people. They were fetishizing it, while often reviling the African immigrants and refugees who lived around the city. Once proud to be Berlin's only Black femme DJ, Elizabeth grew suspicious of why her presence was an anomaly. But if the novelty of her new home couldn't heal her heart and help her find herself, then what could?

A BRAWLING WOMAN mixes memoir and music history, blending her story with those of the artists whose records she spun, many of whom performed at The American Folk Blues Festival—a Black star-studded phenomenon brought to Europe by white Germans, beginning in 1962 and running on and off until 1985. The book will include favorites like Muddy Waters and Memphis Slim, and shed new light on lesser-known greats like Sugar Pie DeSanto, the formidable Black Filipina musician; Big Bill Broonzy, the prolific influencer of both rural and urban culture; Sippie Wallace, one of the founding mothers of the genre who, like other women, were later sidelined by the men who went on to dominate the form, and many more.






