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

MTV cited his story in their list of "2015's Best Moments for the Trans Community" and Buzzfeed named him one of the "11 Transgender people who are shifting our views." Since then, Schuyler has become a go-to expert on gender identity for the media and has given hundreds of talks on gender literacy and inclusion. His corporate clients include Nike, Capital One, Microsoft, Google, the NCAA, and more. Schuyler is already an expert at helping people have this much-needed conversation every day.



He founded and co-director of the Yale Collaborative for Motive Control Studies, which researches and develops public health methods for preventing and treating justice-addiction and violence. 

Pepper Stetler A MEASURE OF INTELLIGENCE: One Mother's Reckoning with the IQ Test


In a quest to advocate for her daughter, Pepper Stetler uncovers the dark history of the IQ that leads her to question what exactly we are measuring when we try to measure intelligence.

When Pepper Stetler was told that her daughter, Louisa, who has Down Syndrome, would be regularly required to take IQ tests to secure support in school, she asked a simple question: why? In questioning the authority and relevance of the test, Stetler set herself on a winding, often dark, investigation into how the IQ test came to be the irrefutable standard for measuring intelligence.

So what are we measuring when we try to measure "intelligence"? As she uncovers the history of IQ, exposing its roots in eugenics, racism, xenophobia, and ableism, Stetler realizes that the desire to quantify intelligence is closely tied to a desire to segregate society. She traces its legacy from inception to the present day, where schools and society have adopted the IQ as shorthand for an individual's aptitude—in essence, their worth. Boldly, Stetler questions how this rigid definition of intelligence has influenced who society holds up as successful and, perhaps more importantly, what it is that we miss when we judge someone solely on their measured intelligence.

Blending lived experience with historical analysis, *A MEASURE OF INTELLIGENCE* investigates the origins and influence of the IQ test on our modern education system, questions how we define and judge intelligence, challenges this system's flawed foundation, and argues for a fundamental reevaluation of how we understand an individual's perceived potential.

Pepper Stetler is an Associate Professor of Art History and the Associate Director of the Humanities Center at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. She has written extensively on issues facing people with intellectual disabilities and their caregivers in publications such as *The New York Times*, *The Atlantic, Slate, Ploughshares*, and *Gulf Coast*. Stetler also writes about the art and photography of early twentieth century Europe, including exhibition catalog essays for the Museum of Modern Art and the Los Angeles County Museum of Art.



From the astronautical engineer venerated by both NASA and today's space entrepreneurs, here is what we will achieve on Mars—and how.

SpaceX, Blue Origin, and Virgin Galactic are building fleets of space vehicles to make interplanetary travel as affordable as Old-World passage to America. We will settle on Mars, and with our knowledge of the planet, as analyzed in depth by Zubrin, we will utilize the resources and tackle the challenges that await us. What will we build? Populous Martian city-states producing air, water, food, power, and more. Zubrin's Martian economy will pay for necessary imports and generate income from varied enterprises, such as real estate sales—homes that are airtight and protect against cosmic space radiation, with fish-farm aquariums positioned overhead, letting in sunlight and blocking cosmic rays while providing fascinating views. Zubrin even predicts the Red Planet customs, social relations, and government—of the people, by the people, for the people, with inalienable individual rights—that will overcome traditional forms of oppression to draw Earth immigrants. After all, Mars needs talent.

With all of this in place, Zubrin's Red Planet will become a pressure cooker for invention, benefiting humans on Earth, Mars, and beyond. We can create this magnificent future, making life better, less fatalistic. THE NEW WORLD ON MARS proves that there is no point killing each other over provinces and limited resources when, together, we can create planets.

Robert Zubrin is president of the aerospace R&D company Pioneer Astronautics, which performs advanced space research for NASA, the US Air Force, the US Department of Energy, and private companies. He is the founder and president of the Mars Society. Zubrin is also the author of twelve books, including *The Case for Mars: The Plan to Settle the Red Planet and Why We Must*, with more than 100,000 copies in print in America alone and now in its 25th Anniversary Edition.



This novel marks the end of our narrator's friendship with celebrated Puerto Rican author M. Domínguez. Their relationship—a gray space somewhere between father/daughter and romantic partners—was born out of a fan letter written in Tatum's undergrad dorm room, to a then-30-something Domínguez. She was drawn to his stories, with their mix of Spanish and English and their Latinx characters, who she recognized from real life but had never before seen immortalized in the literary canon. Tatum falls easily into Domínguez's grasp, moving to New York City to stay in his orbit as she tries to discern who she's meant to be. But when Domínguez fictionalizes their relationship for his own career gains, Tatum feels betrayed and cuts off contact. Years later, a journalist intent on exposing Domínguez's dark side prompts Tatum to break her silence. LIKE HAPPINESS is her account to Domínguez of their story, a reckoning with gender and ambition within Latinx politics, and a reclamation of her agency.

LIKE HAPPINESS is for readers who love intense and unapologetically inquisitive stories like Raven Leilani's Luster, who appreciate a narrative bridging the liminal space between believed story and truth like Susan Choi's Trust Exercise, or who are searching for a book exploring the literary world and its questionable men like Sigrid Nunez's The Friend.

Ursula Villarreal-Moura is the author of *Math for the Self-Crippling* (2022), selected by Zinzi Clemmons as the Gold Line Press fiction contest winner. A graduate of Middlebury College, she received her MFA from Sarah Lawrence College and was a VONA/Voices fellow. Her stories, essays, and reviews have appeared in numerous magazines including *Tin House, Catapult, Prairie Schooner, Washington Square Review, Bennington Review, Wigleaf Top 50*, and *Gulf Coast*. Her writing has been nominated for Best of the Net, Best Small Fictions, and a Pushcart Prize, and was longlisted for Best American Short Stories 2015.

THE SIX tells the rich and multilayered story of the first women recruited by NASA to compete to become the first American women in space. Sally Ride is the name most people recognize, but there were also five other women who joined her on this unique journey. They were competing against each other, and competing against history, but they also banded together. When these incredible six women descended on Johnson Space Center in the 1970s, responding to a new recruitment campaign, there were no locker rooms for women. The first thing NASA did for them was create a makeup kit for space, but the women would rather talk about hydraulics than hair and makeup. Even after they outperformed the men on many of the elaborate physical and mental tests, it was still believed that a woman's role in space would be to provide "entertainment" for the men. At a time when women were meant to be astronauts' wives, these women wanted more.

Drawing on extensive interviews, archival research, and unique access, space reporter Loren Grush captures the narrative of this historic era in space exploration, shining a bright light on the women pioneers who made history, opened up new frontiers for women, and inspired little girls everywhere to pursue their passions for science, technology, and whatever else they have been told they can't do.

Loren Grush is a space reporter for *Bloomberg*. Her parents were both NASA engineers, and she grew up next door to the Johnson Space Center in Houston, where her mom worked with Sally Ride. *THE SIX* has the makings of *The Girls of Atomic City, Code Girls*, and *Fly Girls*, all bestsellers. Scribner bought *THE SIX* in the biggest deal of 2020. There will also be a children's edition of *THE SIX* which will be available for translation.

Drawing from exciting new insider sources, an intimate portrait and keen investigation of the parallel lives of two royal families: one born and one self-made.

For the better part of the past century there are two families who have captured the public's imagination: the British royals and the closest thing the U.S. has to royalty, the Kennedy clan. Much ink has been spilled on these two cultural and political institutions, but no one has ever thoughtfully examined these two dynasties side by side. *Town & Country* editor, journalist and royals expert, Caroline Hallemann aims to do just that—a project that becomes especially relevant in this moment when questions of what role these dynasties play, and whether we need them anymore, loom large.

Relying on deep archival research and original new interviews with individuals close to the story, Hallemann will tell an intimate and multi-generational tale of the relationship between the British royals and the Kennedys, offering previously untold accounts of the private connections, shared struggles, and public associations of two of the most famous families in modern history. This is far more than a timeline of their connections: THE KENNEDYS AND THE WINDSORS reveals that these two families drew inspiration, and at times admonition, from one another in ways that shaped their images and their legacies, and indeed history. Hallemann tells the larger story of why a dynasty matters, how it operates in a modern world, and how it can impact history in significant ways.

From the Kennedy's first introduction to the British monarchy, a swirl of parties and pageants and meetings that put John F. Kennedy on the first rung to political office, to the moment Jackie and Elizabeth II found common ground as young mothers bracing to raise children in the public eye (and as devoted horsewomen), to the agony JFK Jr. felt with Princess Diana was felled by the paparazzi and he had to watch helplessly as young William and Harry grieved, like he did, in front of the world. There are the spares – Princess Margaret and Lee Radziwill – with scandal clipping at their heels, and how the family engines churned to protect them. Even the fashion inspirations – Jackie to Diana, Carolyn Bessette to Meghan Markle – and shared passions for service, such as William's recent Earthshot Prize, inspired by JFK decades before, connect these families across an ocean and throughout time.

Caroline Hallemann is the Digital Director of *Town & Country* magazine, where she writes about culture, society, and the world of the rich and powerful. Her work has been featured in *People, Marie Claire, Glamour, Elle, Us Weekly*, and *Hello*, among many others. She has also been featured on BBC radio as a royals expert.



FAMILY OF SPIES plunges readers into the throes of a rising Nazi party in Berlin in the years before WWII, the days of Third Reich parties and pageantry that hid a much more sinister truth. When Ruth, the eldest daughter of the Kuehn family, became the lover of none other than Joseph Goebbels, the Kuehns saw a way out of the hard times that had befallen them: the Nazi party would lead them back to prosperity and respect. That was until Goebbels discovered Ruth was half Jewish. Rather than having Ruth killed, Goebbels remarkably chose to send the entire Kuehn family—parents, Ruth, and her two younger brothers—to Hawaii. There, the Kuehns spied on Pearl Harbor and delivered clandestine information—using a signaling system of lights from the dormer window of their home overlooking the naval base—to the Japanese about the comings and goings of U.S. ships. Amidst the sugar cane farms and pineapple groves, they entertained extravagantly and curried favor with American officers, even as they maneuvered to evade an FBI agent on their tail. Then, when the Kuehns were arrested for their role in the attack, the Keuhn's teenage son – Christine's father – denounced his family and German heritage, enlisted in the U.S. Army, and went on to fight in the Battle of Okinawa.

One of the last truly untold stories of WWII, FAMILY OF SPIES is a complicated excavation of genealogical bombshells, a cautionary tale of a family destroyed by its own secrets, and a riveting true espionage thriller that sheds new light on the machinations behind the devastating attack on Pearl Harbor. Were the Kuehns cunning or clueless, greedy or gullible? The impossible answers to these questions have haunted their descendants for decades since. Drawing on first-hand interviews and confessions, family correspondence, newspaper accounts, and thousands of pages of redacted FBI files, Christine Kuehn illuminates a fascinating and fraught chapter of WWII history, and reckons with her own family's long-hidden, stranger-than-fiction past.

Christine Kuehn is a former journalist who has spent the last 30 years assembling the pieces of this story and the last three years intensively researching and writing. New York Times bestselling author Stephan Talty is acting as consultant on the book as well.



On June 4, 1944—two days before D-Day—a US Navy task force achieved a mission impossible, altering the course of World War II. Captain Daniel Gallery and a band of nine sailors captured German submarine U-505 with all its technology, Nazi encryption codes, and an Enigma cipher machine. It was the first US seizure of an enemy ship in battle since the War of 1812, marking one of the great achievements of the US Navy, shortening the duration of the war and saving countless lives.

In CODENAME NEMO author Charles Lachman captures a Navy task force, U-505, and their ultimate clash in gripping detail, through deep research offering the perspective of both the Germans and the Americans involved. Not one sailor breathed a word of the top-secret seizure. Nothing leaked out. In Berlin, the German Kriegsmarine assumed that U-505 had been blown to bits, with all hands lost at sea. They were unaware that the U-boat and its secrets were now in American hands. The 59 German sailors captured on the high seas were imprisoned in a POW camp in Ruston, Louisiana. Their families in Germany did not know they had survived the war until after the POWs were released in 1946 and finally permitted to return to their homes.

A riveting war tale with cinematic action on the high seas, a multi-year adventure, compelling American heroes, and an intrepid maverick captain who came up with the audacious scheme and successfully carried it out at great physical and professional risk, *CODENAME NEMO* also explores the incredible story of World War II encryption, code breaking, and communication technology.

Charles Lachman is the author of four previous books: Footsteps in the Snow: One Shocking Crime, Two Shattered Families, and the Coldest Case in US History; The Last Lincolns: The Rise & Fall of a Great American Family; A Secret Life: The Lies and Scandals of President Grover Cleveland; and the crime novel, In the Name of the Law. He is the executive producer of the nationally syndicated news magazine, Inside Edition—the enormously popular source for all things news, information, and politics. He has been featured on CNN, MSNBC, History, Lifetime, C-Span, Sirius/XM, and other local and national programs.

In 2018, Poland's right-wing government passed a law mandating that any history of Polish involvement with the Nazis be obscured. It didn't take long (2021) for two scholars to be brought to trial for documenting the death of Jews at the hands of Poles in a small portion of a 1,200-page scholarly work. Free speech defenders worldwide were outraged.

But investigative journalist Judy Rakowsky and her elderly cousin Sam, a Holocaust survivor, are no strangers to this reluctance to unlock history in Poland. Over the course of two decades, the pair traveled back to Sam's hometown in Poland repeatedly, searching the silences for what happened to their relatives who were lost during the Holocaust.

Part memoir, part detective story, part family history, JEWS IN THE GARDEN is the lively, heartfelt account of Sam and Judy's quest for answers to questions that for decades no one dared ask. As Judy trains her investigative eyes and ears toward the task, she senses a cover-up. This unlikely pair knocks on doors, petitions court documents, gets run off properties, seeks clandestine meetings, and ultimately finds Poles who do want to remember that their relatives hid Jews in an effort to save them. They were the Jews in the garden next door. And Judy and Sam want to tell their story.

Judy Rakowsky is an award-winning reporter and editor for outlets including *The Boston Globe*, *People Magazine*, *The Providence Journal*, *The Columbus Citizen-Journal*, and *The Plain Dealer*. She has covered the major stories of our time, from organized crime and bank fraud litigation in Rhode Island in the 1980s to terrorism and security issues after 9/11 to online bullying in the 2000s. She is currently the Managing Director for Crisis and Strategic Communications at Liberty Square Group.

THE HARDEST CLIMB is a riveting, white-knuckle narrative of the six women known as the "Denali Damsels" who, in 1970, pushed through the glass ceiling in the sky, taking on a peak so fearsome that to this day only half the people who attempt it succeed, and more than a hundred people have died trying. For these women climbers, failure was not an option. The stakes were set. When women achieved summits alone, those mountains were deemed "too easy" for men to attempt ever again. So when climber Arlene Blum was told she could join a summit to help with the cooking but could go no further than base camp, what did she do? She found five other like-minded, accomplished, bold women to form their own kind of venture: the first all-female expedition to the top of Denali, also known as "The Great One."

Led by Grace Hoeman, a veteran climber who had tried and failed to summit Denali twice before, the women must show their mettle as weather and supply mishaps plague them, the consternation of other teams breaks down the codes and conduct of safety in climbing, and altitude sickness befalls their leader who irresponsibly hides her illness, threatening the team's survival. Their historic journey culminates in a dramatic and improbable self-rescue at the summit. Together—as the first women in history to plan, execute, and stand on one of the world's high-altitude peaks—all six plant their flag on the top of the highest point in all of North America—and live to tell about it.

Drawing on access to the remaining members of the team, extensive archival research, and the author's own lifetime of pushing boundaries for women in the outdoors, Cassidy Randall brings a new voice and perspective to the adventure category—also long the province of men—with this thrilling, suspenseful narrative. Randall is a journalist experienced at telling narrative nonfiction stories on adventure and people expanding human potential. Her work has appeared in TIME, The New York Times, National Geographic, Rolling Stone, Men's Journal, and Outside, among others, and she's an adventure travel columnist on Forbes. 





It was a chance drive along the windy roads of Oyster Bay on Long Island's exclusive North Shore that led them to the house they would make their forever home. Only, at first, it was a crumbling structure with a real estate sign so old it was covered in vines. THE CHANCELLOR'S MANSION tells the remarkable story of the Arty's quest to stake claim to the American dream—an updated, more inclusive version of it—as they say yes to the house and embark on a massive renovation and reclamation project with three small children in tow.

They must reckon with a litany of reasons why this was a bad idea: room after room filled to the 12-foot-high ceiling with junk; water cascading from above when a tree falls into the roof; toddler dangers everywhere (mold, an abandoned well, and who knew what lay beneath all that mess); the omnipresent sense of their life savings literally being thrown out the window; and then, worse, the passing of a loved one during the early days of Covid. But the Arty's also have moments of discovery and wonder—secret passageways, gravestones on the property from the 1600s, one-of-a-kind architectural details that emerge from the wreckage, and ultimately Jamie unearths the previous owner's story: Thomas McCoun, a prominent judge and well-regarded figure, was not a slave owner (as was common in that area of Long Island for a time) but rather an abolitionist who emancipated a woman of color and paid her a proper salary to work for the family for decades. Perhaps this is the foundation on which the Artys can build something lasting after all, a house with a history they can be proud of and a future that is bright.

The Arty's story has been featured in the Washington Post, Newsday, and on Magnolia Network. Susannah Charleson is a bestselling, award-winning author of three books and an old home and renovation aficionado.



In the vein of Into the Wild, the harrowing true story of three families who embark on an overnight ski adventure only to suffer a grave and mysterious loss in the midst of a massive storm.

In January 2017, three families spent the weekend at a nearby backcountry ski cabin in Colorado, seeking quality time with their close friends and the chance to bond with their gaggle of teenagers by soaking up the expanse of glittering, pristine nature. But when two of the skiers decided to head out early one morning to ski a loop through the fresh powder on their own, they disappeared.

One, Brett Beasley, the father of two girls, was a U.S. Forest Ranger and legendary mountain man, the last person you would expect to get lost in the wild. The second was Cole Walters-Schaler, a scrawny 15-year-old boy who had recently lost his mother to cancer and was searching for solace in the great outdoors. The next 30 hours would prove to be the most harrowing this small mountain community had ever endured. A storm moved in swiftly, smothering the region in unprecedented snowfall, and a search was risky and ill-advised for even the most accomplished guides. Tension among the families grew ever thicker with resentment, blame, and fear.

When the storm clears less than two days later, only one person emerged from the mountains alive.

NATURE'S BARGAIN is a taut, riveting narrative of tragedy, survival, and the cost of living on nature's knife's edge. When Devon O'Neil heard about this story five years later, what struck him most was Cole, the boy who survived, and never spoke to anyone about what happened out there. O'Neil himself backcountry skis four days a week, regularly leaving his two sons with the looming question each time of *will daddy return*? Naturally, then, this tragic story weaseled its way into O'Neil's consciousness. Now, the families, and most notably Cole, the lone survivor of that fateful morning, have agreed to talk about their tragic experience for the first time with O'Neil.

In the tradition of *Into the Wild*, *NATURE'S BARGAIN* is a survival narrative that reverberates with larger human truths and moral questions: What is our contract with nature? What is our responsibility to loved ones when pursuing the thrill of high-risk adventures? Does that calculation change when children are involved? When your way of living gets rattled to its core, do you go on living that way?

Børge Ousland and Mike Horn, two of the world's greatest living explorers, have spent the past three decades wringing some of the last great geographical feats from this world. South-African born Swiss explorer Mike Horn swam the length of the Amazon River and navigated 4,000 jungled miles over six months, while Norwegian Børge Ousland was the first to ski solo to the North Pole and across Antarctica, feats once considered impossible.

So you can imagine Ousland's surprise in 2018 when an inexperienced American named Colin O'Brady brashly claimed to have completed the first solo crossing of Antarctica, an effort he touted as "The Impossible First." Fueled by breathless coverage in *The New York Times*, O'Brady basked in the ensuing adulation. Ousland tried to point out that he had, in fact, already crossed Antarctica. But his modest megaphone could not rival O'Brady's, and few people or media outlets paid him mind.

These three explorers' different methods, and different motivations, would continue to shape their criss-crossing career trajectories over the subsequent years. THIN ICE is the story of old-world exploration versus new. It is an urgent commentary on the modern world in which Colin O'Brady – with his high-dollar marketing firms, purchased social media followers, and paid-off Wikipedia editors – can succeed in making himself more widely known than Børge Ousland and Mike Horn.

Based on new interviews and reporting, *THIN ICE* will tell the story of two of the greatest explorers of our time and the groundbreaking crossing that they pursued not for fame but for the sake of adventure itself. Juxtaposed against a revelatory reckoning with media-darling O'Brady's narratives of his own exploits, what emerges is an archetypal cautionary tale about the corrosive power of unchecked ambition that brings the purer aspirations of Ousland and Horn into relief.

JUNK is a portrait of our humanity among the machines, a search for valid feelings among the trash, and a reckoning with the emotional refuse we generate. Even if the nostalgia, the objects, and the junk decay over time, our connection to these things can still have a human voice, one that interprets, warns, and lends lasting value.

M.M. Carrigan's (they/them) essays on nostalgia and pop culture have appeared in VICE, Bon Appetit, Eater, Literary Hub, The Rumpus, and more. They are the editor of Taco Bell Quarterly, an online literary magazine known amongst the Literati as "a magazine of significant literary influence." Their thoughts and interviews have appeared in The New Yorker, Eater, The Take Out, Vox, Salon, Food & Wine, The New York Post, Mental Floss, and beyond. They received a Masters in Writing from Johns Hopkins University which has not yet come close to returning the investment their parents said it would.



In the mid- to late nineties, women were supposed to be reveling in a false promise of "progress." Young girls were told they could be more than their mothers, and then the world did anything they could to kick them down. Women who made music at this time—Fiona Apple, Liz Phair, Courtney Love, Ani DiFranco, Alanis Morrisette, the Indigo Girls, Lauryn Hill—were both feminine and aggressive, full of casual rage, easy sex, and a willingness to name the men who wronged them. These women spoke of things that made everyone around them uncomfortable and forced us to address the things that no one really wanted to talk about. In return, they were painted as ungrateful bitches, fame whores, or women piggybacking on the shoulders of more powerful men. More than anything, they were painted as angry. Still, there was a young group of girls growing up with these women, who grew because of them. This next generation of girl fans grew into the female artists who shape our own time, from Avril Lavigne to Maggie Rogers to Kacey Musgraves to Phoebe Bridgers. These loud, fearless women of the 90s are the reason we have Brandi Carlile, Olivia Rodrigo, and Taylor Swift.

WHAT SHE NEEDS IS A GOOD DEFENSE tells the story and the truth about the women who rocked the nineties and built the next generation of musical stars all while the world failed to celebrate, understand, or make room for their legacies. It's an appreciation of a drastic change in teenage womanhood: an exploration of this generation who arrived on the cusp of the internet, at a moment before public (and private) women would be ripped to shreds in tabloids, online, on social media. Before Instagram filters, these women were fighting back about how we define ourselves and our beauty; before #metoo, they were speaking openly about rape and abuse. How would things be different now if we listened to them?

This book is a musical memoir—an appreciation, critical study, and historical rewrite through the eyes of a woman who grew up in the thick of it. Award-winning journalist Marissa R. 



In 1960 an Eastern Airlines flight had no sooner lifted from the runway at Boston Logan Airport when it abruptly took a nose dive into the frigid waters of the Boston Harbor, killing 62 people. This was the nascent, golden age of commercial airflight – luxury in the skies – and a bird strike – the suspected cause of the crash – was the last thing the airline industry needed. The FAA instructed the bird's remains be sent to the Smithsonian Institution for examination. There, they would land on the desk of the only person in the world equipped to make sense of it all. Laybourne didn't know it at the time, but that dead bird marked the start of a remarkable scientific journey that would consume her life and change the course of aviation. She became the world's first forensic ornithologist.

THE FEATHER DETECTIVE takes readers deep within the vaunted backrooms of the Smithsonian to tell the story of a burgeoning science and the enigmatic woman who pioneered it. While her male counterparts were off on exotic assignments exploring relics in Egypt or traipsing through the wilds of Africa, Roxie Laybourne stayed with her birds. Just as forensics was coming into vogue and colliding with anthropology, Roxie was piecing together deadly airplane crashes and eventually helping solve murders – using nothing more than a microscope and some bird feathers. Part CSI, part Hidden Figures, and part H Is For Hawk, THE FEATHER DETECTIVE is a fascinating tale of what happens when nature and technology collide that illuminates the birth of forensic anthropology, the heyday of the Smithsonian Institution, the triumph of a determined woman breaking down barriers in science, and the amazing paths one's passion can lead them down.

Chris Sweeney, whose journalism has appeared in Audubon, Wired, Popular Science, and Men's Journal, first wrote about Roxie in a fall 2020 feature story for Audubon magazine called "The Incredible Life of Roxie Laybourne." 





THE LAST COUNTERFEITER is the true story of the mastermind counterfeiter who replicated the impossible 1996 \$100 USD note, forged millions, and dodged the Secret Service, but ultimately couldn't escape the pain of his broken childhood. When Art Williams Jr.'s father abandoned the family and his bipolar mother succumbed to the siren-song of her illness, a life of crime in 1970s Chicago quickly claimed him. Parking meter theft led to robbing drug dealers. Then, Art learned the skill of counterfeiting money.

In the following years, Art printed millions in fake bills, selling them to criminal organizations while trying to raise a family on the side. His greatest challenge arose with the Treasury Department's new and most secure hundred-dollar bill ever: the 1996 \$100 USD note. After months spent painstakingly perfecting the new counterfeit bill, he created an indistinguishable copy, capable not only of fooling the naked eye, but also of bypassing even the strictest security measures. While Art slipped by the Secret Service hunting him, he searched for his long-lost father, a path that ultimately led to his undoing and another prison sentence.

In this new edition, thirteen years later, journalist Jason Kersten details how Art's latest stint behind bars, which found him sharing a cell with his own son, finally had the desired effect, convincing him to start a new life. For twenty seasons he was resident naturalist in the Gray Whale nursery in San Ignacio Lagoon, in Baja, Mexico. 

With echoes of *Unbroken*, the derring-do and bravado of *The Right Stuff*, and the battle-forged comradery of *Band of Brothers*, *INTO ENEMY WATERS* is the World War II story of 95-year-old veteran George Morgan and the elite Underwater Demolition Teams, precursor of the Navy SEALs—who were given nearly impossible pre-invasion

missions from D-Day to the most crucial landings in the Pacific Theater. Morgan, among the last living members of WWII's Underwater Demolition Teams, was just a wiry 17-year-old lifeguard from New Jersey when he joined the Navy's new combat unit, tasked to blow up enemy coastal defenses ahead of landings by Allied forces. His first assignment: Omaha Beach on D-Day. When he returned stateside, Morgan learned that his service was only beginning. Outfitted with swim trunks, a dive mask, and fins, he was sent to Hawaii and then on to deployments in the Pacific as a member of the elite and pioneering UDTs. GIs called them "half fish, half nuts." Today, we call them frogmen—and Navy SEALs.

Led by maverick Naval Reserve Officer Draper Kauffman, Morgan would spend the fierce final year of the war swimming up to enemy controlled beaches to gather intel and detonate underwater barriers. He'd have to master the sea, muster superhuman grit, and overcome the demons of Omaha Beach. Moving closer to Japan, the enemy's island defenses were growing more elaborate and its soldiers more fanatical. From the black sand beaches of Iwo Jima to the shark-infested reefs of Okinawa, to the cold seas of Tokyo Bay, teenaged George Morgan was there before most, fighting for his life.







In Lincoln, Montana, the Gehrings shared their land, their home, and their dinner table with a hermit with a penchant for murder. But they had no idea that the odd recluse living in the adjacent cabin was anything more than a disheveled man who brought young Jamie painted rocks as gifts. Ted was simply Ted, and erratic behavior, surprise visits, and chilling events while Jamie was riding horses or helping her dad at his sawmill were dismissed because he was "just the odd hermit." In fact, he

was much more—Ted eluded the FBI for seventeen years while mailing explosives to strangers, earning the infamous title of Unabomber.

The innocence of her youth robbed, Gehring needed to reconcile her lived experience with the evil that hid in plain sight. In this book, through years of research probing Ted's personal history, his writings, his secret coded crime journals, her own correspondence with him in his Supermax prison cell, plus interviews with others close to Kaczynski, Gehring unearths the complexity, mystery, and tragedy of her childhood with the madman in the woods. And she uncovers a shocking revelation—she and her family were in Kaczynski's crosshairs.

A work of intricately braided research, journalism, and personal memories, this book is a chilling response to the question: Do you really know your neighbor?



Joe Kelly is a ten-year Major League veteran, having won the World Series with both the Boston Red Sox and Los Angeles Dodgers. He also went to the World Series with the St. Louis Cardinals, the franchise that selected him in the third round of the 2009 Major League Baseball Draft. Rob Bradford has covered the Boston Red Sox for more than twenty years, covering Major League Baseball for the Lowell Sun, Lawrence Eagle-Tribune, Boston Herald, and WEEI. 



When one thinks of the beginnings of school desegregation in America, the images of the Little Rock Nine immediately come to mind. But before those nine young men and women of color made history entering Central High School in 1957, there came the Clinton 12 – twelve Black high school students who in 1956 desegregated an all-white high school in the foothills of the Appalachians in Tennessee. There were death threats and beatings, picket lines and safety shelters. Neighbors turned on neighbors. The national guard rumbled through town. Small town preachers for the first time found themselves at a loss for words. Tensions continued to escalate until a series of bombs were detonated inside Clinton High School, destroying half of the building and a whole generation's innocence. Nevertheless, school in Clinton, Tennessee—desegregated school—went on. Unlike its more urban counterparts at the time—Little Rock, Birmingham, Atlanta—Clinton's integration story could be called a "success." But only those who were there knew the cost.

Together, the Clinton 12 made those first, uneasy but essential steps toward that goal of equal education for all, a goal which some seventy years later sadly still eludes us. But their story is vitally important, a missing link in the chain of events that formed the civil rights movement as we know it today. Historian and writer Rachel Martin has conducted nearly 70 oral history interviews with the former students of Clinton High School, as well as educators, residents, and witnesses of this period. Drawing on these interviews as well as meticulous research, she will tell a character-driven story of this small town in the throes of big change, through the point of view of the students who experienced it firsthand.

Rachel Martin is an historian and journalist whose work has appeared in O Magazine, Oxford American, Catapult, Bitter Southerner and The Atlantic. She is the author of Hot History: The True Story of a City, a Family and an Obsession and holds a PhD in women's and gender history from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.



Entertainer of the Year at the CMA Awards for a decade. A world where women artists sell out arenas but barely score a single second of airplay. 

For many, Waco is synonymous with the word "cult" and a fifty-one day siege of the American government on its own people. 
