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Do you care?

Raising children, taking care of parents, cooking, and cleaning – for many, the end of the workday feels like a second shift. And then there’s not enough money to make ends meet. While others earn millions through financial investments, those who perform care work are left with barely enough to live on. But burnout is seen as a personal failure, and poverty in old age as individual misfortune. This is no coincidence – it’s politics. Care work is the invisible foundation of our economy, and those who perform it are systematically exploited. This book puts an end to the feeling that it’s your own fault. Because what was created through political means can be changed through political means. Feline Tecklenburg analyzes why the redistribution of time, power, and money isn’t radical – it’s long overdue. The question isn’t whether we can afford it. The question is how much longer we’re willing to put up with a system that expects the most important work to be done for free.

This book is for everyone who feels the daily pressure of care, who is angry at a system that renders their work invisible, and who finally wants to understand and bring about change instead of just going through the motions. Care work is not a private matter – it is the foundation of our economy!

Feline Tecklenburg, born in 1992, is a political economist. She is a co-founder and co-executive director of the think tank and action workshop “Wirtschaft ist Care” (Economy Is Care). At the University of Paderborn, she conducts research on the care economy within sustainable economic models and co-edited the anthology *Rethinking the Economy* in 2023. As a sought-after keynote speaker, she appears at conferences in Germany and Switzerland. She lives in Berlin.

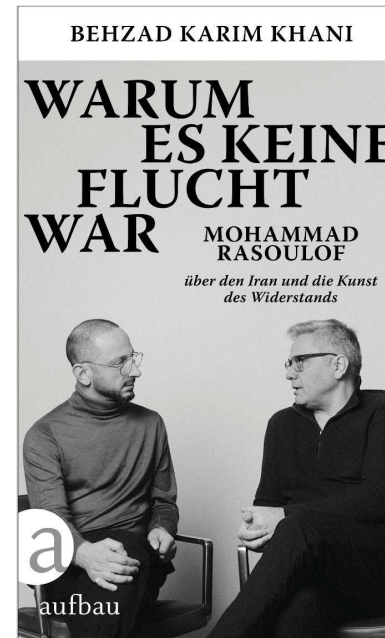
Two voices from Iran: Art as resistance against authoritarian power

By chance, Behzad Karim Khani and Mohammad Rasoulof are brought together for an interview. One is an author whose latest novel ends with the promise to leave Germany. The other, an award-winning filmmaker who has found a safe haven here. Karim Khani is deeply impressed by this man, who experienced more in 2024 alone than most people do in their entire lives. Imprisonment in an Iranian jail. Escaping on foot across the Iranian border. Standing ovations in Cannes. An Oscar nomination.

Two men, two exiles, two perspectives: on long walks through Berlin, the two talk about exile and identity. About reform and revolution, about whether there is an aesthetic of dictatorship and one of resistance. About beauty, love, and integrity. And about holding fast to art as an expression of freedom.

Behzad Karim Khani was born in Tehran in 1977 and grew up in a family of artists. He was not yet ten years old when he came to Germany with his parents, who settled in the Ruhr region. He studied art history and media studies at Ruhr University Bochum. He has lived in Berlin-Kreuzberg since 2003, where he ran the Lugosi Bar from 2012 to 2022. His debut novel, *Hund, Wolf Schakal* (*Dog, Wolf, Jackal*) was published in 2022.

Mohammad Rasoulof was born in 1973 in Shiraz, Iran. He is a filmmaker, producer, and artist. Due to the political situation in the Islamic Republic of Iran, his work was severely restricted. In July 2022, he was arrested in Iran and, in May 2024, sentenced to eight years in prison and flogging. He subsequently fled Iran. Upon arriving in Germany, Rasoulof completed his film *The Seed of the Sacred Fig* in just a few days. In it, he captures the impact of the 2022 Iranian “Woman, Life, Freedom” protest movement on a family in Tehran. The film won the Special Jury Prize at the Cannes Film Festival and was submitted by Germany as its entry for Best International Feature Film at the Oscars.

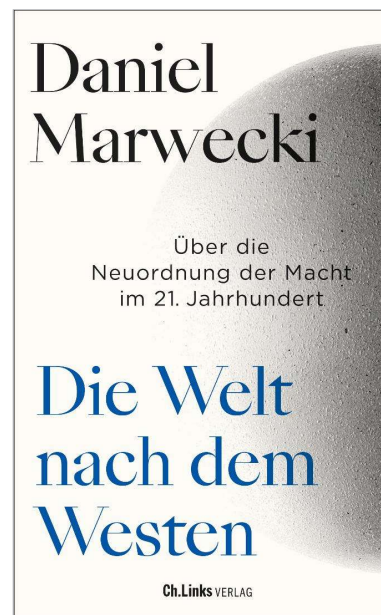

What comes after 300 years of Western dominance?

The world that Europe created in the 19th century has become a world that the West is no longer able to reign over alone. Serbia – A key country in transition

For a long time, the majority of the Serbian population was thought to be politically disinterested. Protests that flared up sporadically proved unsuccessful. When the canopy of the train station in Novi Sad collapsed in November 2024, killing several people, that changed abruptly. Across the country, a broad protest movement emerged: one in which people are demanding answers, denouncing abuses in government and administration, and calling for the rule of law, public oversight, and a meaningful fight against corruption. Since then, President Vučić has come under increasing pressure.

Balkan expert Florian Bieber uses this powerful movement to illustrate the importance of civil protest, for Serbia, but also for Europe, Russia, and the US. Because autocrats like Vučić, Orbán, Putin, and Trump fear civil unrest worldwide — and use the same exact tactics to fight it.

Florian Bieber, born in 1973, is considered one of the foremost experts on the Balkan region. He is a professor of Southeast European history and politics at the University of Graz and director of the Center for Southeast European Studies there. He has taught in the US, the UK, Italy, Bosnia, Serbia, and Hungary, and has lived in Belgrade and Sarajevo for more than five years. To date, he has written six books in English and German on nationalism, the EU, and political developments in the Balkans. His analyses have appeared in *The New York Times*, *Neue Zürcher Zeitung*, *Der Standard*, *Die Zeit*, *Die Presse*, *Politico*, and other publications. He is a regular contributor to national and international media outlets. In 2023, Ch. Links published his book *The Balkan Tinderbox – How Dictatorships Are Exerting Influence in Europe*.

Learning how to really feel climate change

What we know about glaciers is determined by glaciology and climate science: the Arctic is warming up, Greenland's glaciers are melting rapidly, huge icebergs are breaking off the ice shelf in Antarctica, and the glaciers of the Alps will have disappeared by 2080. All this knowledge is pivotal, yet it tells us nothing about what it is like to stand on a glacier and feel that specific cold, sharp wind on your face. People's love of ice and their concern and grief at its disappearance find expression in poetry and art. From Goethe, Lord Byron and Mary Wollstonecraft to Adalbert Stifter, Friedrich Nietzsche, Walter Benjamin and Mark Twain: they, and many others, were both fascinated and unsettled by glaciers.

This book is dedicated to people's historical and current relationships with ice and glaciers. Anne-Sophie Balzer takes us on a journey through 250 years of poetic glacier history and how it is reflected in stories, poems and works of art. An exceptional and existential exploration.

Anne-Sophie Balzer was born in 1988, the same year a NASA scientist explained the Congress of the United States that climate change was real. She is a literary scholar and works as an author and journalist with a focus on Scandinavia and the far North. Why we need new feminist strategies in the era of post-patriarchal chaos

Current political developments are not evidence of the enduring strength of patriarchy, but signs of its demise. Patriarchy was a hierarchical order with “old white men” at the top, supported by recognized institutions such as universities, parliaments, and churches. Those days are over. Today, power is based on the rule of the strongest, physical violence, economic superiority, and arbitrariness. This is not patriarchy, but post-patriarchal chaos. Feminist strategies must respond to this. Because it is pointless to demand recognition and equality from autocrats – one must confront them with subversive liberation practices, resilience, and self-organization. The equality- and emancipation-focused feminism of the 20th century has certainly tried successfully to win over the traditional patriarchal authorities to its own cause. But this strategy has reached its limits. A change in policy is necessary.

In her intellectually sparkling and cleverly pointed essay, political scientist Antje Schrupp takes a (self-)critical look at the women’s movement and outlines perspectives for a future-oriented, constructive feminism whose primary concern is a free society. An intellectual firework display!

Antje Schrupp is a political scientist and journalist living in Frankfurt am Main. Her research focuses primarily on the political history of women’s ideology, and she wrote her doctoral thesis on feminist socialists in the 19th century. She has also been involved in feminist economic ethics for many years. In her blog *For the Love of Freedom*, she engages in current feminist debates and recently called on the church to acknowledge its guilt for centuries of patriarchal theology.

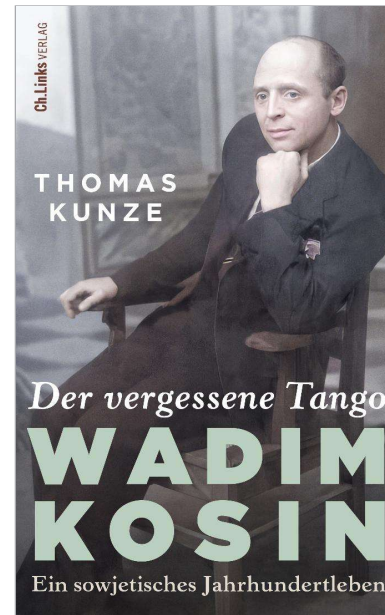

He filled the concert halls of the Soviet Union, sang for Stalin, spent eight years in the Gulag as a gay man, and was one of the greatest Russian stage stars of the 20th century: The tenor Vadim Kozin (1903–1994) was the country's most famous singer; his records were in high demand. Not a day went by without his voice being heard on the radio. But one day in May 1944, there was complete silence – as if he had never existed ...

Thomas Kunze sets out to uncover the truth. He traces Kozin's life from his meteoric rise to his arrest and the years that followed – even as a free man, Kozin never left Siberia again. A man born shortly after the turn of the century in the Russian Empire who lived through the entire Soviet century. Kunze gained exclusive access to Kozin's diaries, spoke with the last surviving eyewitnesses, and reveals an unknown facet of the Stalin era.

Thomas Kunze, born in 1963, studied history, German language and literature, and education in Jena and Leipzig, and earned his doctorate in modern history in 1991. He has worked for the Konrad Adenauer Foundation since 2002 and has headed its overseas offices in Central Asia, Russia, and, since 2022, Albania. He has written numerous books on German and Eastern European contemporary history, including biographies of Nicolae Ceausescu and Erich Honecker. He lives in Tirana and Berlin.

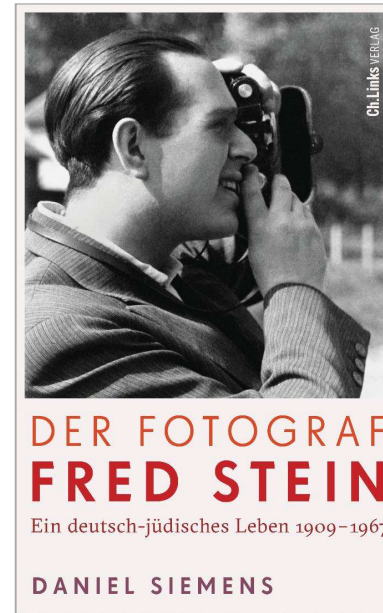

The first biography of Fred Stein: Photographer, exile and chronicler of the 20th century

Hannah Arendt, smoking a cigarette while reclining, Thomas Mann at his writing desk, a smiling Albert Einstein, Bertolt Brecht in profile. These photographs are world-famous, but their photographer is largely unknown. His name: Fred Stein. A master of portrait photography, his pictures are a veritable who's who of the 20th century.

In the first-ever biography of Fred Stein, historian Daniel Siemens traces the impressive life and achievements of the man behind the camera: dismissed in 1933, the Jewish lawyer fled into exile with his wife Lilo under the pretense of a honeymoon, first to Paris and later to the USA. The second-hand Leica that the young couple bought was just the beginning: over the course of three decades, Stein photographed over 1,000 artists, politicians and celebrities. His photographs portray dignity, humanity – and a world that was often denied to the exile himself.

Daniel Siemens is Professor of European History at Newcastle University in the United Kingdom and author of several books on 20th-century history. His book *Horst Wessel: Death and Transfiguration of a National Socialist*, published in 2009, was widely discussed and received considerable attention beyond academic circles. It was awarded the “Geisteswissenschaften International” prize and has also been available in English translation since 2013. In 2017, his study *Stormtroopers: A New History of Hitler's Brown-shirts* was published in English by Yale University Press. Translations into German, Polish and Chinese followed in 2019.

Will the city miss its residents when they are gone one day?

Gregor Hens traverses the metropolises of the world as a reader, as a walker and even as a swimmer, from Berlin via Las Vegas to Shenzhen, from the outermost fringes of society to the dull spaces of city centres marketed for tourism. Gregor Hens is at home in urban spaces, like in his native city of Cologne or in Berlin, where the city map corresponds to his own life circumstances and he moves around through »cityscapes« day and night. He writes about familiar, far-away metropolises that he has explored as a traveller, metropolises for which we only have a defined image in our minds, or which we hold onto in our collective memory, and megacities somewhere in the world that he only mentions by name.

Gregor Hens explores the urban world of our planet in the tradition of psychogeography, reads Virginia Woolf, Guy Debord and Rem Koolhaas, digs into the deepest layers of a city and ascends with the camera eye until it is at his feet in all its complexity and beauty: as a picture, as a map, played on by marvelling children and sometimes stopped in its tracks by catastrophe. Cities and their alternative concepts are complex structures consisting of innumerable aesthetic elements. They are dealt with in Gregor Hens' prose, which reads like a detailed street map that offers the most surprising links and references.

Gregor Hens, born in Cologne in 1965, has taught at various American universities, most recently at Ohio State University. He has been living in Berlin as a freelance writer and translator since 2013. He has translated numerous novels, including ones by Leonard Cohen and Will Self.

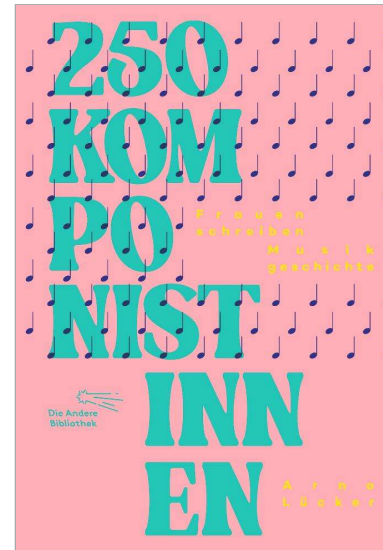

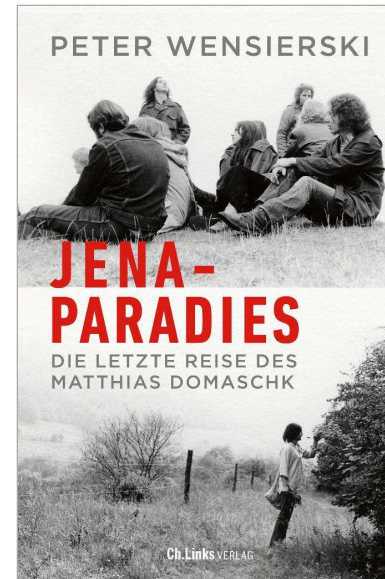

A young generation in search of a free and self-determined life

Friday, 10 April 1981: In Jena, East Germany, 23-year-old Matthias Domaschk boards the express train to Berlin. He's on his way to a birthday party. But he never arrives, because the packed train is stopped in Jüterbog and Matthias and three other residents of Jena are arrested. Two days later, he lies dead in the visitors' room of the Stasi detention centre in Gera. What happened back then?

Peter Wensierski captivantly tells the story of a non-conformist young man and his adversaries in a totalitarian state, based on Matthias Domaschk's final days. He sheds light on how the police raid on a shared flat and the protest against Wolf Biermann's expatriation became turning points for the Jena scene. And he paints the picture of an increasingly politicised generation that went against their conformist parents and intolerant citizens, and who communicated politically and culturally across borders as early as the 1970's in search of an upstanding and self-determined life.

Peter Wensierski, born in 1954, is a documentary filmmaker and studied political science, history and journalism at the Freie Universität Berlin. From 1979 he reported as a journalist from the GDR and from 1986 to 1993 he was a television journalist for ARD and worked for various magazines. Wensierski has been awarded the German Film Award, the European Television Award and the German Cross of Merit. He has had several books published, including the bestsellers *The Forbidden Journey* (2014) and *The Incredible Ease of Revolution* (2017). *Berlin – The City of Revolt* (2018) was published by Ch. Links Verlag.

20th century history packed into the life of a pragmatic intellectual

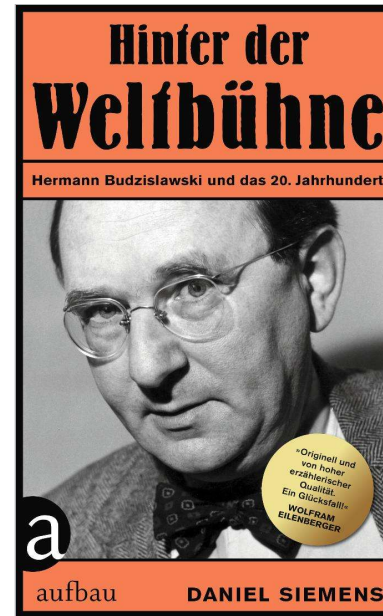
Hermann Budzislawski survived more regime changes and was effective in more diverse ways than any other left-wing intellectual: be it as the successor to Carl von Ossietzky and Kurt Tucholsky as head of the "Weltbühne" newspaper after 1933, as an employee of Dorothy Thompson in the U.S. or as a defining figure of socialist journalism in the GDR. With astonishing agility, not only did Budzislawski manage to survive all existential threats, but he continuously gained new influence in different countries. His biography maps out a complex panorama of the 20th century, explores the freedom of socialist politics and questions the price of political adjustment and resistance.

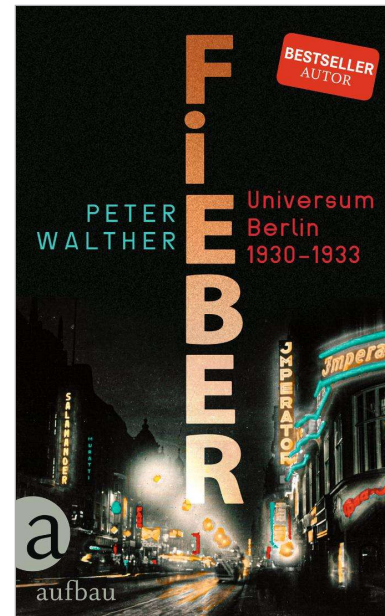

Peter Walther, born in Berlin in 1965, studied German and art history and gained a doctorate in 1995. In 2017 he published the bestselling *Hans Fallada: The Biography*.

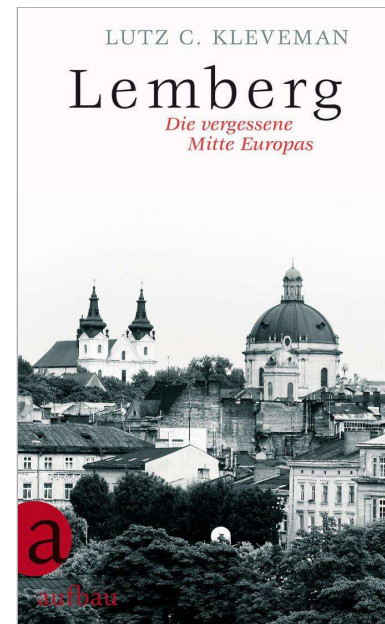
The biography of a secretive city

Once part of the Habsburg Empire, early-twentieth-century Lviv boasted enough extraordinary artists and scientists to rival Berlin and Vienna. The city was considered the 'Jerusalem of Europe', where Poles, Jews, Ukrainians and Germans lived side by side. War, the Holocaust and forced migration drained Lviv of nearly all its inhabitants – and its memory.

When crisis struck the Ukraine in 2014, Lutz Kleveman travelled to Lviv to uncover the city's buried past. He stumbled across famous figures like Joseph Roth and Paul Celan, as well as characters like the Jewish poet Debora Vogel and the epidemiologist Rudolf Weigl, who saved hundreds of people from the murderous terror of the Soviets and the Nazis in his laboratory. In the Ukraine, the crimes of those years are still hushed up or reinterpreted. Anyone wanting to understand the contemporary conflict, however, has to be aware of the true history of Lviv. Using this city and its population as a lens, Lutz Kleveman brilliantly tells the story of European history.

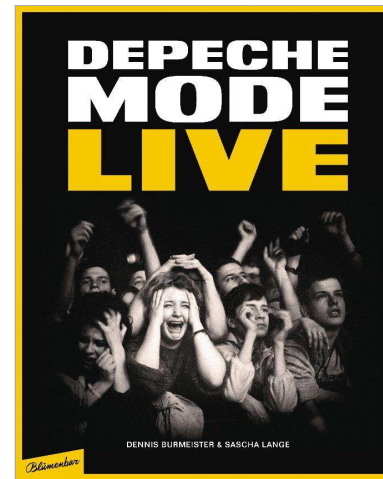

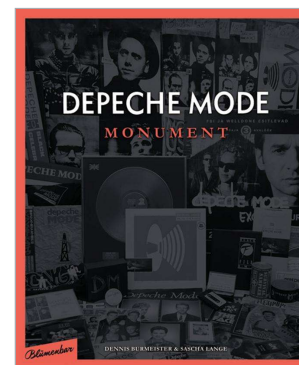
