

"The village is everywhere!" - A philosophical-political essay on why our desire for the countryside is reactionary

About the book

Cities are growing, but more and more people are moving out into the provinces. Björn Vedder has also moved back to a rural community. In the meantime, however, his bold thesis is that the provinces are mean. Because behind the oh-so tranquil facades often lies a different reality: a crude mixture of wealth and family values, status consumption, pressure to conform and social control. One small deviation in behaviour is enough for you to be hounded, teased, ostracised and shamed by the majority. Community harbours meanness. So why does everyone want to "get out"?

Based on his own experiences and with a great deal of black humour, Björn Vedder dismantles the myth of a better life in rural areas and exposes a fundamental mindset that, for him, is no longer only to be found in the provinces, but is taking hold of our society as a provincial spirit.

Jil Sander is Germany's most famous fashion designer. At a time when women were only allowed to open a bank account and work with the permission of their husbands, she began designing fashion that no longer had anything in common with the staid role models of the 1950s and 1960s. With her minimalist designs, Jil Sander created the "New Look" of the modern working woman: casual, successful, self-confident. The iconic flacons with which Jil Sander complemented her brand were indispensable in any bathroom in the 1980s and 1990s, even though perfumes were almost exclusively imported from France at the time. Naked in the GDR

My Great-Uncle Willi Sitte and What the Whole Story Has To Do with Me

About the book

Willi Sitte – artist, committed Communist, functionary, power player. He's considered one of the most influential and controversial painters of the German Democratic Republic (East Germany). Aron Boks is his great-grandnephew. For most of his life, Aron has shown very little interest in his famous relative – not until, at a family reunion, a painting suddenly appears: *The Holy Family*. Then Aron begins to ask questions: who was Willi Sitte, really, and what motivated him?

This painting serves as the starting point for his biographical research that confronts him with events during and after WWII, particularly in the years preceding and following the fall of the Berlin Wall. Eventually it dawns on him that this preoccupation with his family and the GDR has also become a preoccupation with himself. Aron collects, inquires, and links together events that shaped the course of Willi Sitte's life. He talks to witnesses of the time: Ingrid Sitte, Wolf Biermann, Gerhard Wolf, Volker Braun.

For Aron, who never experienced the GDR, the painter Willi Sitte reveals himself as a human being in inner turmoil. Between ideology and idealism, fame, power, art and recognition. A search that leads us to the most important questions of recent German history.




About the book

Not Dependent - On Alcohol and Letting Go

Radically sober – abstinence as feminist empower-

About the book

German consumption of alcohol has been falling for years, but for one group it's increasing: educated, well-to-do women over 30. Strange, isn't it? Aren't those the women who, in spite of their fify-hour work weeks, still find time for workouts, watch what they eat, and have made mindfulness their new motto in life? Yes, it's precisely these women who, first thing after a hard day of work, uncork a bottle of wine. More than a few polish it off.

For years, Eva Biringer was one of them. She drank to relax, to reward herself, to comfort herself, to function well enough to be able to meet expectations, and to not feel a lot of things. More than once she woke up in the morning with no memory of the night before. Using her own story as a cautionary tale, she wants to raise awareness: about the reasons that cause more and more women to reach much too often for the bottle; and about a society that doesn't want to see what drives them to it. Crystal-clear and scalpel-sharp, Eva Biringer dissects her own addictive behavior - one that's latent in all of us.


Dance of Death - 1923 and Its Ripple Effects

In the midst of rapture, revolution, and radicalization – Chronicle of a Year

About the book

1923 proves to be a political and economic turning point for Germany: reparation demands, Hitler's putsch, hyperinflation. Jutta Hoffritz tells us of dizzingly high bread prices, escapist nights of titillating dance, the far-reaching consequences of the Ruhr occupation, increasing levels of poverty, and the introduction of the Rentenmark - the turbulence of a year that even now, a hundred years later, seems terrifyingly current. The lives of Käthe Kollwitz, Anita Berber, Hugo Stinnes, and Rudolf Havenstein represent the events and trends of the time: the entrepreneur Hugo Stinnes embodies the radicalizing right; Käthe Kollwitz, who votes for the social democrats and draws posters for the communists, stands for the divided left. Anita Berber, the scandal-ridden nude dancer, represents, with her danse macabre, the intoxication and excess, the mutation and downfall. Rudolf Havenstein, president of the Reichsbank, represents the plummeting currency and hyperinflation. About a whirlwind year that saw the dominance of hyperinflation, the failure of Hitler's Beer Hall Putsch, and the introduction of the Charleston. The year that marked the beginning of Germany's Golden Twenties.
