With vibrant poignancy, "Crooked Timber" tells the story of sibling bonds in a loveless childhood and explores how love can emerge amidst shattered hopes.

A postcard from Zurich that reaches Lev in his northern Romanian home village has only one sentence on it: "When are you coming?" In their childhood, Lev and Kato were inseparable. But when the borders opened in Europe, Kato turned her back on her home village and on Lev and sets off west. With beauty and devotion, Iris Wolff tells about timeless friendship and about what it takes to break free from one's origins.

When eleven-year-old Lev is confined to bed for weeks, Kato, of all people, who is clever but shunned by everyone, is sent to his bed-side to bring him his homework. An unbreakable bond develops between the mismatched pair, providing a foothold for the two adolescents in the multi-ethnic communist state of Romania. Half a lifetime later, Lev is still walking the paths of his childhood, while Kato left for the West years ago. All that remains for Lev are her drawn postcards from all over Europe. Until one day he receives a card from Zurich pushing open the gate to the past again.

Iris Wolff tells the story of Kato and Lev backwards, from the present to the 1960s. Little by little, we learn about the events that shaped the two of them. About the grandfather's escape, Lev's time in the military, about dictatorship and resistance, about belonging and a touching friendship that reveals itself as a journey into the past the glow of which resonates for a long time. Skillfully and with great poetic intensity, Iris Wolff transforms into language this very moment when one life touches another.




### A melancholic-literary tribute to the culture of pinball

Flashing pinball machines are at the centre of Andreas Bernard's autobiographical account. His discovery of the machines in childhood. His forays through the neighbourhood bars, directed just as much by a mental map of pinball machine locations as by a knowledge of his hometown. And playing pinball as a way of warding off loneliness and boredom – and later as a catalyst for first love.

From the 1960s to the 1990s, pinball machines were found in almost every pub, bar and amusement arcade in Germany and the USA. They are a firm fixture in the films of the Nouvelle Vague and the new German cinema of Wenders and Fassbinder, as well as the early novels of Modiano, Murakami and Rainald Goetz. Using pinball machines as a unifying thread, Andreas Bernard tells the story of his youth and of a city in flux. The disappearance of pinball machines at the end of the Nineties reflects the far broader changes to the face of cities, and the end of industrial labour. »The Solace of Pinball Machines« is both a contemporary commentary and a literary memoir. A gem of a book that revisits the pop culture of our past which may now have vanished, but which is still capable of reawakening the feelings we felt as children and young adults.

## Anyone who goes through life with breasts knows that they always mean something. But what?

»Breasts« is a collection of texts that resembles a look in the mirror, or a check-up with the gynaecologist. But it is also a space for the cultural history of a gaze, of a framing; a space for processing, for embracing – and for liberation. We don't talk enough about breasts, we don't write enough about them, we don't read enough about them – but as anyone who goes through life, or part of life, with breasts knows: they always mean something.

Breasts are political, now more than ever. They cause arousal and agitation. The range of themes in this book is as diverse as its contributors, encompassing physicality, age, illness, mortality, sexuality and gender performance, but also care bodies, sexualisation, aestheticisation, objectification and shame.



Beginning with his Judesein (Jewishness), which was forced upon him by the Nuremberg Laws, Jean Améry describes his existential bond with Israel – although his solidarity is not unconditional. For him, however, Israel is the land that taught all the disenfranchised Jews of the world to stand tall. We hear his pain here, for Améry – who has always been left-wing – can no longer align himself with the New Left, which sees Israel as colonialist: it is clear to him that the New Left's self-righteous anti-Zionism is in fact ineradicable antisemitism.

Jean Améry, born as Hans Mayer in Vienna in October 1912, is considered one of the most significant European intellectuals of the sixties and seventies. His ground-breaking essays may only be compared in importance to the writings of Hannah Arendt and Theodor W. Adorno. In their reflection on existence in the extermination camp, they are likely closest to Primo Levi's books. At the same time, however, Améry, unlike any other intellectual, introduced and confronted the German public with French thinkers and writers. Jean Améry took his own life in October 1978.

Irene Heidelberger-Leonard, born in 1944 in emigration in France, was a professor at the Université Libre de Bruxelles and published works on Günter Grass, Alfred Andersch, Jurek Becker, W. G. Sebald, and Imre Kertész. She is the general editor of the Améry collected edition published by Klett-Cotta. Her biography »Jean Améry. Revolt in Resignation« (2004) received the Einhard Foundation Prize for outstanding biography.


Born in the GDR, Stine grows up in reunified Germany. She is just three years old when the Wall comes down. But her family are deeply wedded to a system they cannot move on from, and to the belief that they have lived the 'right' life. In this wonderfully intelligent and clear-eyed book, Anne Rabe tells the story of a generation whose origins are an empty space.

Stine is born in the mid-1980s in a small town on the East German Baltic coast, a child of reunification. She is too young to understand the change of system in the GDR, but her family's complex ideological views have an impact on the next generation. As her relatives hide the lost world behind an impenetrable silence, Stine finds herself asking questions she can no longer repress. #### Multi-layered, moving family and father-daughter novel, haunting and atmospheric


In Karla's family, everyone knows what it feels like not to belong. Karla experiences it as a child in Bremen Nord. Her father Avi in a monastery school in Jerusalem. Her grandmother Maryam as a guest worker in Germany. Her great-grandmother Armine on the streets of Istanbul. With sensitivity and a fine sense of humour, Laura Cwiertnia traces the branching paths of an Armenian family whose experiences are so profound that they still resonate generations later.

The children from the high-rise housing estate in Bremen Nord know exactly where their families came from: Turkey, Russia, Albania. But not Karla. All she knows is that her grandmother came to Germany from Istanbul as a guest worker in the 1960s, and that the family has Armenian roots, but they don't talk about it. When Karla's grandmother dies, the name of a woman appears, along with an address in Armenia. 



# Following up on the international success of Time of the Magicians & The Visionaries: A grand panorama of post-war contemplation

Wolfram Eilenberger once again combines history and the history of ideas to take readers on a singular narrative and intellectual adventure.

»To write a poem after Auschwitz is barbaric,« wrote Theodor W. Adorno in 1949, the year after his return from the US to Germany. But wasn't the same true for philosophy? How, if at all, can you make a new attempt at thinking when you've stared into the abyss? Have the ideals of the Enlightenment been lost forever? Do science, art, and democracy still hold any promise? Or has the time come to say goodbye to the very idea of humanity? Exploring the thought of Theodor W. Adorno, Susan Sontag, Michel Foucault, and Paul K. Feyerabend, four intellectual icons of the post-War era, and moving between Frankfurt, Paris, London, Berkeley, and New York, THE HAUNTED PRESENT traces the coming into being of a set of ideas that lead directly to the great fault lines of the present: from a debunking of blind faith in progress to conspiracy theories; from sexual liberation to narrow-minded, reflexive wokeness; from the radical avant-garde to the collapse of all distinctions between high- and low-brow culture; from a critique of technology to ecoactivism; from the call for a new Enlightenment to the definitive deconstruction of Western thought and its idee fixe of human beings as defined by their ability to think. Or, put differently: from the ghosts of the post-War era to the present – increasingly haunted and more than ever in need of philosophy.

#### Every third pregnancy ends in a miscarriage – and nobody is talking about it

A shortage of data, a lack of funding for research, inadequate medical care and poor legal protection: although one in three pregnancies ends in miscarriage, the issue is still seldom talked about. And this unsatisfactory social discourse, with its myths and misconceptions about the reasons for and causes of miscarriage, adds to the suffering of women who have miscarried. Journalist Eva Lindner breaks down this taboo and shows us a way out of the silence.

Eva Lindner is sixteen weeks pregnant when she loses her baby. In the bathroom, completely unprepared, with her three-year-old daughter asleep in the next room. Only later does she make it to hospital, where she waits for the operation she needs. Beside her bed, the staff joke about trivial things – to them she is a routine case. After all, Eva Lindner's loss is just one of the millions suffered globally every year.

Alongside feminist activists, experts and influencers, a growing number of prominent people are sharing their experiences publicly, including Michelle Obama, Mark Zuckerberg and his wife Priscilla Chan, Britney Spears, Beyoncé, Pamela Anderson, Jennifer Lawrence, Cher, Sharon Stone and Meghan Markle.

It is estimated that one in three pregnancies ends in miscarriage, with serious mental health consequences in fifty percent of cases. This is partly because miscarriage is still such a taboo. In her book, Eva Lindner talks to experienced midwives, gynaecologists and lawyers about the reasons for this. She shows what needs to change in order for society to give the issue the attention it deserves – attention which is long overdue.



### Half a century of German and European history

Wolfgang Schäuble was a political phenomenon. Few people have done as much to shape Germany as he has. Memoirs, completed shortly before his death, gives us a unique insight into the history of Germany and the hidden mechanisms of its political system. It takes stock of a life in politics and a farreaching political legacy, serving as an important record of the values and attitudes espoused by Wolfgang Schäuble throughout his life.

He was the longest-serving member of the German Parliament. His political career is a reflection of half a century of German history, and of West Germany's transformation from the Bonn Republic into the Berlin Republic. The former government minister, leader of the CDU, head of the CDU/CSU parliamentary group, and German president, looks back on the beginning of his career and on his successes and defeats. 



Andreas Petersen traces the history of depth psychology in the East, and shows how it was completely banned in the Soviet Union in the 1930s. This ban shaped attitudes to psychoanalysis throughout Eastern Europe until 1989 – with effects that are felt to this day.

Based on Freud's discovery of the unconscious, the twentieth century saw a 'psychological turn' in the USA and then in Western Europe which led to a repositioning of the individual and society. Self-realisation and the promise of happiness through individualisation became the defining social model for postwar societies. And the East? Having initially taken a strong interest in depth psychology and psychoanalysis, Stalin ended up banning all individual psychological approaches and replacing them with the purely biologistic theory of Ivan Pavlov. Andreas Petersen traces this less well-known but socially very consequential development in a vivid account based on biographies of analysts, clinicians and psychologists who faced difficult struggles and even persecution. The increasing estrangement between East and West has its roots partly in their different psycho-historical influences.

Andreas Petersen studied general history, Eastern European history and German studies in Zurich. His book »Die Moskauer. Wie das Stalintrauma die DDR prägte« (S. Fischer), about the founding generation of the GDR, was published in 2019.

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


