THE WOMEN'S REVOLUTION IN THE FORMER SOVIET STATES

A unique, gripping journey to places where history is being made – from Belarus to Ukraine, from Georgia to Kyrgyzstan

When the world saw images of women in Belarus demonstrating against Aleksandr Lukashenko, the opposition movement against the "last European dictator" gained momentum. Meanwhile, in Russia women went onto the streets to support Alexei Navalny, and in many other former Soviet states too, people have been calling for the dismantling of the old structures that still persist in both politics and daily life.

This revolution is predominantly female: it is the women who are making the decisive advances. The journalist and Moscow correspondent Jo Angerer tells the story of these uprisings, using personal stories to reveal the precarious social position of women in the region, and placing their experience in the context of the Soviet Union and the status of women in the former communist state. He argues that the former Soviet states are merely restoring patriarchal gender divisions, and that their women are still seriously disadvantaged. Angerer reports on the women's resistance movements in several of these countries, from Belarus, Russia and Ukraine all the way to Kyrgyzstan and Azerbaijan – including moving, sometimes shocking, accounts, and the kinds of stories that aren't usually thought worth mentioning in the news. An illuminating look at this region's politics and its key protagonists.

He explains how dogmatism, "them and us" thinking and online mob mentality are endangering freedom of speech in the US, and warns that we have to act now to resist this new fundamentalism and safeguard our freedoms.

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



Divided into three parts – "Love", "Work" and "Meaning" – this book introduces us to 21 twenty-first-century neuroses. Hepp spans a wide range from internet and online sex addiction, relationship fears and growing loneliness (despite global connectedness), from dating and profile neuroses to educational competition and sickening perfectionism, self-optimisation and uniqueness compulsions to the eternity promises of age research and the new data religion.

To help us counteract these dizzying tendencies, the author provides a perceptive, but also hopeful and humorous examination for our fast-paced times of bits and bytes. Through concrete advice, personal experiences and examples from his psychotherapeutic practice, Hepp helps us to strengthen our psychological resistance in the face of the digital manipulation we're subjected to and to find our way safely through the digital jungle.

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

With this book, Birgit Lutz, expert on the Arctic, takes us on a very special journey – this time, however, it's not a freezing expedition to the North Pole or a whale hunt in East Greenland with the Inuit, but a wake-up call. For here, Lutz explores the hitherto little-known changes that the warming of the Arctic has inflicted on our landscape.

In 2021, she travelled to Spitzbergen, and this is her account of a transformation that may have begun gradually, but is now proceeding at pace. She talks to those directly affected by it, as well as to renowned scientists. Yet "An Epigraph to the Arctic" is intended to be more than a reiteration of our shock and helplessness in the face of catastrophe. It is, in fact, a call to action: we urgently need to seize the day and rethink the way we live and behave. Each of us can do their bit to help turn the tide, and preserve and protect this unique region – and with it the whole planet, in all its diversity.

A small hotel on the Riviera dei Fiori becomes a meeting point for exiles and literary figures

This is the history of the Villa Verde, the little hotel in San Remo once owned by Dora Sophie Kellner, Walter Benjamin's ex-wife. Dora was an ambitious author, translator and journalist; she was also Jewish, and left Berlin when Hitler came to power. A practical woman with a head for business, she built a new life for herself and her son Stefan in San Remo – and this hotel high above the sea, which she owned from 1934 to 1940, turned out a great success. It was frequented by authors, artists and journalists, as well as aristocrats, profiteers, refugees and speculators, and her guests included everyone from the Adornos to the dramatist Richard Beer-Hofmann. Walter Benjamin himself returned again and again, calling it his "oasis of calm" during those itinerant years. Yet the hotel also witnessed dramatic events – jealousy, intrigues, love affairs, and all the major and minor tragedies of life in exile. In 1940, two years after Dora managed to flee to London, the Italian race laws forced it to close.

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

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
