HANS PLATZGUMER

A power vacuum that ideologues know how to use. A natural disaster that turns a country on its head. Based on a period of Japanese history, Hans Platzgumer tells a universal, captivating story that feels almost uncanny in its striking resemblance to modern-day political intrigues.

In 1912, Yoshihito, a young man aged only 32, was crowned emperor of Japan in Tokyo. His nearly fifteen-year rule would go down in Japanese history as the Taishō era. Military officer Amakasu, a staunch servant of the Japanese secret police, looks back on the war that shaped his life. For decades, in the shadow of Emperor Yoshihito, who was more interested in poetry and plants than politics and the state of his empire, he fought a bitter battle against the anarchist and insurgent Sakae Ôsugi and his wife Itô. But then the great Kantō earthquake in 1923 not only destroyed Tokyo but ushered in a political zero hour. In the shadow of the natural disaster, Amakasu's police force flouted rules and laws, and the Japanese people were at their mercy.



Dirk Schümer

was born in 1962 in Soest, and studied German language and literature, philosophy and medieval history in Hamburg and Paris. 

DIRK SCHÜMER

It's 1348. The Plague rages in the financial metropolis of Florence, while the sons of the powerful banker Pacino Peruzzi are being murdered one by one. Wittekind Tentronk, who has moved to the city on the Arno to work as the agent of the patriarch, recognises too late that the murderous race for money and revenge going on here is one he can only lose.

As he did in his much-acclaimed novel The Black Rose, Dirk Schümer draws an arc here to the present day. He looks at the biggest banking crisis in history pre-2008, the worst pandemic of all time, and the Crimean War. He also follows Wittekind's romance with the attractive market woman Ciocca, as well as the distinguished group of friends that surrounds Dante's alcoholic son, Jacopo, and the down-and-out poet Boccaccio.


The result is a page-turning portrait of an era steeped in history that draws many parallels to the present day.

Drago Jančar

was born in Maribor in 1948, lives in Ljubljana and is regarded as the most significant living Slovenian author. His novels, essays and plays have been translated into many languages. In 1974 he was arrested for >hostile propaganda<. He has won numerous awards including the Kresnik Prize, the Jean Améry Prize and the 2020 Austrian State Prize for European Literature. His most recent novel was When Love is At Rest (In Ijubezen tudi) (2017).

DRAGO JANČAR

Danijel doesn't know who to please: his father, who forever celebrates victory over Nazi Germany with his comrades from the League of Communist Fighters. Or his mother, who sends him to the Capuchin Order for religious instruction. One side makes him pledge the pioneers' oath, the other, the creed of Pater Aloisius.

Changes are in store when a young secretary called Lena moves into the ground-floor flat, not only capturing Danijel's imagination but also creating a stir in the entire district. Drago Jančar's skilful story is set in the town of Maribor in the 1950s. Normality is slowly returning. The immediate hardship and deprivation of the post-war period, and the struggles of the Yugo-slavian people, are over for the time being.

Danijel grows up during this time of transition, and we embark on a journey shaped by his psychological development, desires, search for role models and longings.

She talks about how her parents' world shaped her views, but also how she confronted it, the hopes and failure it has led to, and what she shares with her friends Elizabeth T. Spira, Robert Schindel, André Glucksmann and others.


Two families, the Binders and the Strobl-Marineks, are treating themselves to a luxury holiday in Tuscany. Engelbert Binder is a charming wine-maker, his considerably younger wife Melanie a failed actress. Oskar Marinek is a cynical humanities scholar, and his wife Elisa Strobl-Marinek is a successful politician for the Green Party. Sophie Luise, the Strobl-Marinek's teen daughter, has brought along a schoolmate to fight the boredom. Her name is Aayana, a child refugee from Somalia. But no sooner has the holiday mood begun with chilled prosecco and antipasti than catastrophe strikes.

You Don't See Them is a novel about relationships in the style we have come to expect from Glattauer. And it's a court drama – a genre he is particularly apt at writing after working for years as a court reporter.

The novel uses many text styles (blog posts, E-mails, comments, newspaper articles and dialogues) and thus presents a 'best-of' in Glattauer's repertoire. Glattauer uses these elements to take a snapshot of morality in a privileged society, exposing its double standards and lending a voice to those who have virtually none.



climate change with Oprah Winfrey.





The short novel What Is It You Seek, Wolf?
by Eva Viežnaviec caused a literary
sensation in Belarus and was awarded the
country's highest award for prose, the Jerzy
Giedroyc Literature Prize, in December 2021.

The book sets off down the road like a modernday beatnik novel. On an alcohol-fuelled trip, protagonist Ryna travels from Germany to Belarus for her grandmother's funeral. The old lady was a traditional healer who was considered a witch by her neighbours and tried to teach Ryna the »arts« of herbal medicine. Ryna's inner dialogue with her beloved grandmother imperceptibly turns into a monologue. What follows is the intrepid 100-year-old woman's account as a survivor of the First World War, the October Revolution and civil war, collectivisation and Second World War – the entire twentieth century with all its atrocities. The story ends in the present, a time when Ryna has found peace, thanks partly to her grandmother's wealth of experience. Without glorifying events, this melancholic, harrowing book draws hope from the magic of everyday life.



Since the morning of 24 February 2022, nothing has been the same. On this day, Vladimir Putin declared war on Ukraine and shortly afterwards prohibited any criticism of his >special military operation. Despite censorship measures, Paul Krisai and Miriam Beller have continued to report from Moscow. They interview imprisoned opposition politicians via prison mail, talk to stranded Ukrainian refugees and travel thousands of kilometres through Russia, Georgia, Belarus and Kazakhstan to understand how the war is fundamentally changing Russia and the countries that surround it. What are the effects of Western sanctions? How do oppression and surveillance affect society? And how do you report under censorship? What makes a human being? In this clever essay, Lisz Hirn addresses none other than this fundamental question of philosophy. What distinguishes people from animals has occupied thinkers from Plato to Nietzsche and Foucault. When we stop eating animals, what happens to our self-image? Hirn poses questions that draw on concepts from the fields of biology and medicine, the church and religion, education and socio-political issues (from the development of in-vitro or cultivated meat to euthanasia). Ultimately, the climate crisis and pandemic have rattled the concept we have of ourselves as >superior(beings. Is artificial intelligence now stealing the show? Lisz Hirn has devised a new approach: an anthropology of vulnerability for the meta-human caught between smartphone and ChatGPT. She clearly illustrates how we overestimate ourselves but do not take our vulnerability seriously enough.
